The object of my pneumatic apparatus is to charge or fill reservoirs or conduits with compressed actions bodies by means of some known mechanical power. The force-pumps A'A', refrigerating-pipes f f for for form, and main reservoir are stationary, as shown in the drawing, and the compressed gaseous mediums are transferred from the force-pump or pumps or main pipes, or from this fixed main reservoir, by means of pipes, tubes, stop-cocks, and the proper valves and valve-graring and appendages. By means of my invention the compressed gaseous bodies can be used for the purposes of transmitting power, and to reproduce some considerable purtion of the power required for the compression, at the extremity of the conduit from the condenser or main reservoir at any desired locality, within any reasonable distance, through any of the convenient forms of sleam engine or pumpsor other mechanism suitable for the purpose, and with or without the addition of heat, as may be required; or by detaching the reservoir from the condenser the power contained in the compressed air may be used for the purposes of iocomotion or navigation as well as for operating machinery.
