NEWS ITEMS.

Laramie won't be satisfied with less than a \$100,000 hotel.

The Oregon City Woolen Mills are running to their utmost capacity.

The flouring mills at Lafayette are crowding the wheat through from 18 to 24 hours a day.

The Eugene City Yarn Mills have run out of staple, and want 100,000 pounds of wool immediately.

Stone masons and brick-layers command from \$7 to \$12 a day in Helena, and are scarce as that.

The County Court of Jackson county let the contract for building the new jail to Smith & Hall at \$3,750.

Two wagon loads of pumpkins and squashes were raised from four seeds on Luke Taylor's place, Young River. The vines covers 40 feet square.

The gross receipts of the Olympia Fair were something in excess of \$900—more than enough, we understand, to pay off all expenses incurred.

Mrs. Barnes, of Olympia, took the first premium on washing machines at the recent Fair of the Western Washington Industrial Association.

The Hillboro district schoolhouse building looks quite handsome in its new coat of paint. It is the handsomest building of the kind in the county. D. M. G. Gault keeps a number one school in it also.

The capital stock of the Yamhill River Improvement Company is \$50,000, divided into shares of \$50 each. The incorporators are J. W. Cowles, T. B. Handley, H. B. Burns, G. Wilson and C. J. Handley.

The dedication ceremonies of the Catholic Church took place in Astoria on Sunday, the 19th inst. The dedication was made by Archbishop Blanchet, and the church was christened, "Mary, Star of the Sea."

The Albany warehouses and mills are nearly full of grain now, yet it is estimated that nearly one-third of the crop is yet to be stored. The inquiry is therefore pertinent, where is the balance of the grain to be stored?

The Yamhill County Council of Grangers met at Lafayette on Monday last, and transacted important business. Twelve Granges were represented. The next Council will meet at McMinnville on the last Monday in December.

The camp-meeting recently held at Dixie was much disturbed by hoodlums. Cutting saddles and harness, taking line-pins out of wagons, setting fire around the camp-grounds on fire, and divers and sturdy pilferings, are among the exploits noted.

Mr. E. Smith, carriage maker of Portland, exhibited one open and one covered buggy upon the Fair grounds. 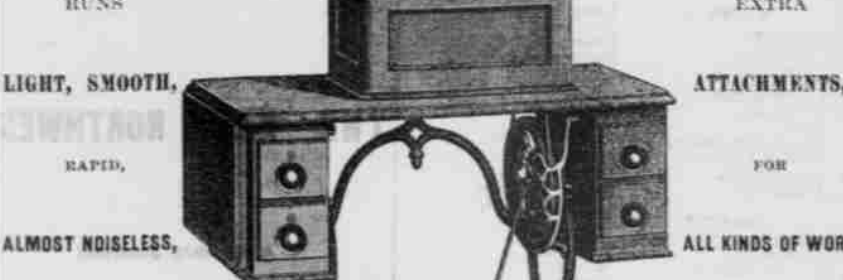

Congress has extended the time for filing claims for additional bounty under the Act of July 28, 1866, to January 1, 1875, so that all such claims must be made before that time. Original Bounty of \$30 has been allowed all volunteers who enlisted before July 22nd, 1861, for three years. If not paid the same when discharged, Land Warrants can be obtained for service in the late war. Pensions for late war and of 1852-obtained and increased for services in surviving veterans of Texas revolution. New Orleans and Mobile Prize Money is now due and being paid. W. H.
