LETTER FROM PORTLAND.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE NEW NORTHWEST: I have been a reader of your paper about one year. At first, I cared very little about it; but, as weeks rolled by, I began to imbibe its spirit and investigate its truths, and the NEW NORTHWEST has become a welcome visitor in our family.

I followed Mrs. Dunaway in her winding tour through Southern Oregon, and was startled when I heard that a drunken mob had beaten her with eggs and burned her in effigy. But I was rejoiced to see the pluck, nerve and energy that she possessed in daring to face the mob, and stand up boldly for the principle of equal suffrage for both sexes. I was astounded when I saw that a paper like the West Shore, of this city, would, in a driving editorial, get right down on its marrow-bones and powder to the mob at Jacksonville for patronage. But I am glad to know that it is about the only paper in the State that has such a low opinion of the fifth and mire of selfishness as to enlogize a mob and insult Mrs. Dunaway, as the editor did, by telling her that she had a right to command that her paper be edited with a little more decency than would be expected of a pot-house politician!

During the year that the NEW NORTHWEST has been a regular visitor in my home, we have had three young ladies in the family, and we all fall to see in it one word that any pre-mind person cannot read with benefit. But you did shake the little chap of the West Shore right hard, and may it do him good.

Permit me to say that the principles for which you are so nobly battling are growing stronger every day. As the people read and study, intelligent men and women will everywhere embrace the truth; and drunken demagogues will continue to fight the right, just as they did in the days of slavery. The degraded scene at Jacksonville will live in history, and those very eggs that were thrown at the defender of woman's rights will be the next eggs from which will spring into life a principle that will save the people from drunkenness and its twin companion, prostitution.

I remember, when a small boy (my father lived in Indiana), that old Ben Wade came through our State lecturing on abolitionism. He did not come to our town, but an honest old Quaker by the name of Jesse Jones came and made the first anti-slavery speech the people had heard, and they threw eggs at him and threatened his life; but he went on preaching against oppression, in spite of mobs. And I remember that, after the passage of the fugitive slave law, a poor slave was fleeing from the bondage of the free United States to seek a home in Canada, and, being hard pressed, came to my father's house. Three slave-catchers in the neighborhood were on his track, and he hid in my father's cellar, under our log cabin. My father told those man-hunters that his children would live to see slavery abolished in this nation, and thank God it is true.

I believe that Mrs. Dunaway is battling for a principle stronger than the emancipation of negro slaves; and I believe that Oregon will be among the first of the States to wheel to the front in this great movement. Success to the NEW NORTHWEST and the cause it advocates.
