

LOCAL NEWS.

Annetta Stump, charged with arson, has been acquitted. It is rumored that the Sunday Mercury is to be issued as a daily. Claude Taylor, of East Portland, has been appointed a Notary Public. The collections in Trinity Church on Easter morning amounted to \$255. Mr. E. S. Kearney has entered upon his duties as U. S. Marshal of Oregon. Mr. D. F. Farg-Aly, well-known to old Portlanders, died in this city last week. The Evening Telegram is an excellent local paper, though inclined to be sensational. Mrs. J. W. Fisher, well-known in this city and in Idaho, died at the Dalles on the 23d ult. An interesting time is promised at the Open Temperance Meeting on Saturday evening. A beacon will be erected at the Swan Island bar in the Willapa bay for the benefit of pilots. Sixteen candidates presented themselves on Saturday as applicants for school certificates. Mr. John Starr, at one time a prominent citizen of Portland, died at New Tacoma last week. Two mining claims have been located on the Columbia River from Lodge's, a few miles from this city. Dr. T. T. Cabanis has been appointed a surgeon in the U. S. Army, and leaves for Camp Howard to-day. On Friday night last, another lodge of the Ancient Order United Workmen was instituted in this city. John Donnaner has received a contract for furnishing the Fire Department with 1,000 feet of hose. An eighteen-year-old boy, named Escobar, from Linn county, was committed to the asylum last week. Mr. J. H. Robbins has commenced the erection of a \$3,000 dwelling on the corner of Mill and Lowland streets. A. Whitlock, one of the owners of the Central Market Restaurant, has taken the partnership funds and departed. The entire property of the O. S. N. Co. has been transferred to the O. R. & N. Co. The consideration is \$1,425,000. Owing to the superior finish and excellence of work, Abel stands pre-eminent as a photographer. Give him a call. The School Investigating Committee is carefully examining the manner in which the schools of this city are conducted. A temperance lodge of the Independent Order of Good Samaritans and Daughters of Samaria has been incorporated. Grading for the narrow-gauge railroad between the furnace and the ore beds of the Oswego Iron Company is progressing rapidly. Census Supervisor Sakaloff has received no applications for positions as enumerators in Coos, Curry, Lake and Josephine counties. The African M. E. O'Connell, editor of the San Jose Mercury, delivered a lecture on Sunday evening at Turn Hall, to men only, on the "Evils of Over-Population." The Old Fellows of this State will, on April 22nd, celebrate the sixty-first anniversary of the introduction of Odd Fellowship into the United States. The Naval Court places the blame for the loss of the Dilbarre on Pilot Hewett. He gave Paacock Spitt too wide a berth and struck the sand opposite. Mr. C. E. Tilton has withdrawn from the banking firm of Ladd & Tilton. The house will be conducted under the old name by Mr. W. S. Ladd and his son, Wm. M. Ladd. Memorial services in honor of the distinguished French statesman, Isaac Adolphe Cremieux, who died on the 10th of February, were held at the Synagogue on Sunday evening. The sixth lecture in the course on social science, given by the Christian Church, was delivered last evening by Judge E. D. Shattuck on "Realizable Ideals in the Administration of Law." A man named S. Anderson was severely hurt last Saturday morning while removing goods from the burning building on M and Thirteenth streets. The loss by the fire amounts to \$1,500. The funeral of Captain Connor, of the steamship Oregon, took place at San Francisco on Sunday from the Gravelly Street Unitarian church. Rev. W. W. McKelg and Mrs. Harding-Britten officiated. John A. At the Democratic County Convention on Saturday, the ticket of delegates to the State Convention, as published in the Oregonian, with one or two immaterial changes, was elected. Whiteaker was endorsed for Congress. A company has been incorporated for the purpose of running a ferry line from the foot of Jefferson street to the foot of U street in East Portland. The capital stock is \$20,000, in 200 shares; incorporated with W. H. Andrews, L. Freeland and Wm. Sweeney. Articles of incorporation of a new savings bank were filed last Friday by D. P. Thompson, J. N. Dolph, M. S. Barrell, Frank Dekum, Sol Hirsch and S. B. Skidmore. Business will be commenced on the 1st inst. Capital stock, \$125,000, in 1,250 shares. The social party given by several of Portland's fairest young ladies at Handel and Hayden Hall on Tuesday evening was largely attended, and all present passed a pleasant evening. Many expressed the wish that the ladies would give another party. FOREIGN NEWS.

The Chinese trade for 1880 is very promising. The King of Siam will visit the United States this summer. The business portion of Siamann, Santa Domingo, has been burned. The weather in British Columbia is still severe, and stock is perishing. The Berlin, the new official organ at St. Petersburg, is unfavorably received. The British have assumed the whole administration of north and east Afghanistan. Coal oil has been discovered in large quantities in the vicinity of Lake Alusky, Cape Barrow. Mohamed Jan has been defeated in Afghanistan, with a loss of 70 men, including his brother. The Empress Eugenie has sailed for South Africa to visit the scene of the Prince Imperial's death. A man named Bennett tried to kill Brown, of the Globe, but was wounded by the editor. The number of men killed in the St. Gothard tunnel during its construction was 120, and wounded, 400. Beef has advanced two cents a pound in Nova Scotia, owing to the demand for meat for export to England. The breach between France and Russia is widening. General Canby has been called to Paris from St. Petersburg. Over 100 medical students, who were arrested on suspicion eleven months ago, have been released by the Russian Government. An ex-Member of the British Parliament has been hastily cheered for advising the Irish to leave the House if Ireland is denied justice. Russia is jealous of American competition in the grain trade. An American vessel has taken care to Olesha for the famine-stricken people in the Caucasus. Baroness Bartlett counts does not support the Liberals in England because she thinks them too disgraced to offer a strong government to the country. Afghanistan will be separated into its constituent provinces, and the British Government will be guided by the wishes of the people regarding a ruler. Defalcations to the amount of £100,000 have been discovered in the Russian Overland Custom House, high-class goods having been cleared at low rates of duty. Parnell was forced to give up an attempt to speak at Edoecrocity recently. He was received with yells and groans and eggs, and was nearly buried from the platform.
