## FOREIGN NEWS.

Para Mil

The English suthorities are kept busy captur-ing arms in transit to Ireland.

Lima, Peru, is said to be well defended against the Chilian forces, and a desperate battle is an-ticipated.

President Anderwer of the Swiss Confederation committed suicide on the 27th instant, probably while temporarily insane. The relatively small majority by which he was elected greatly disap-pointed him, and he believed his life was in daner by secret enemies.

On the 23d instant, a party of Boers of South Africa attacked and overpowered 250 men of the ninety-fourth British regiment, killing nearly half of them and taking the rest prisoners. It is believed the leaders of the Boers do not sanction the attack, as the prisoners have been released.

The Irish State trial of agitators, or traversers, was commenced in Dublin on Tuesday before the Court of the Queen's Bench. Chief Justice May voluntarily declined to preside over the trial, and Justice Fitzgerald took the chief seat. The de-fendants were cheered on their appearance. The jury is composed of eight Catholics, three Protest-ants and one Quaker.

The Transvaal (South Africa) Republic has pub-lished a decree declaring that the Government has no desire to spill blood and no wish for war, has no desire to spill blood and no wish for war, but is anxious to join in everything leading to progress; that no advancement of the people of the Republic can be made until their independ-ence is acknowledged; that it rests with the Brit-ish whether or not the Republic will be forced to appeal to arms in self-defense, which will be done with all reverence for the queen and with full knowledge that it is a struggle for the sanctity of treaties, which have been broken by British officers.—In reply to the decree, Major Lanyon is-sued a proclamation offering pardon to all who immediately withdrew from the malcontent camp. camp.

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
