[Universal morriment.] He then referred to the slavery days of his race, feelingly alluded to the noble women who had helped them, out of bondage, and paid a rilliant and eloquent tribute to the memory of William Lloyd Garrison, who, assisted by Luwells Mott, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan R. Anthony, and many other women, had given the best years of their life to the cause of human sancipation. He said it was due to the women who had assisted, by their noble, self-sacrificing forts, to tree his race, that colored men should now come to the front and assist these women, that they might themselves be free. He held the audience rapt at times, and again moved them at his will into uncontrollable bursts of applause and laughter.
