

GENERAL NEWS.

Congress has adjourned until December next. The Chinese in Chicago have formed a Masonic society.

Mrs. Garfield has nearly recovered from her recent sickness.

Colonel Thos. A. Scott died at Clifton, Penn., on Saturday last.

Commissioner Williamson of the General Land Office has resigned.

Register Bruce of the Treasury Department has commenced his duties.

Blaine is reported to be taking a hand in the fight in New York over the Senatorship.

The revised New Testament was published in full in the two leading Chicago dailies of Sunday last.

The New York Times is completely showing up all the dark transactions of the 'star' route postal gang.

Second Assistant Postmaster-General Elmer, Brady's successor, has assumed the duties of the office.

Henry Ward Beecher sanctions most of the changes in the New Testament made by the revisers.

Commander Glass, of the Jamestown, has assumed a protectorate over property rights in Alaska.

The immigration arrivals continue to be heavy, and efforts are being made to get the new-comers to go to the South.

O'Brien, a New York Congressman, has obtained a divorce from his wife on the ground that she maltreated him.

Dancer has just won the six-day go-as-you-please match in San Francisco, making the best Pacific Coast record, 518 miles.

The steamers Ganos and Pembroke collided near Boston on Friday, the former being sunk. The loss will be about \$500,000.

Postmaster-General James says no clemency will be shown to any 'star' route swindler, his motto being 'let no guilty man escape.'

General Grant has written a letter to Senator Jones, of Nevada, in which he expresses himself in full sympathy with Conkling in the present fight.

The only saloon in Lompoc, Cal., has been blown to pieces by a large bomb. Lompoc is a temperance colony, and this is the second saloon destroyed by gunpowder there.

A Des Moines (Iowa) dispatch says six young lady composers in the Leader office have struck for a raise from 20 to 22 cents per thousand ems, and that their places cannot be supplied.

On last Friday, a cave in the Golden Terra mine at Terraville, Dakota, killed a number of miners. Nine men were covered up for some time, but were released with only a few bruises.

Leland Stanford, of California, through the New York Commercial Bulletin, has been elaborating his views on railroads and their rights. He thinks they have a right to all they can get.

Kalloch has gone East, and will probably obtrude himself at the Baptist anniversary in Indianapolis. If he seeks recognition, he will create a breeze, as there is a pronounced sentiment against him.

The reports from Albany, N. Y., are somewhat conflicting. One dispatch reports that Conkling cannot be re-elected to the Senate, another says he will form a coalition with the Democrats, and still a third positively asserts that he will be returned as a straight Republican.

An explosion occurred in a saloon at St. Joseph, Mo., on Tuesday night, and a number of colored men were killed. The walls were blown out, and the barkeeper, a very large man, was caught by the feet under the falling roof, and burned to death while struggling desperately and appealing for aid.

O. L. Whitney, Custodian of the Treasury Department at Washington, is found to have been engaged for years in a system of systematic speculation. His business has been to buy everything needed in the treasury, such as furniture, carpets, soap, etc., and it is ascertained that he has for six years violated the law requiring him to purchase by contract from the lowest bidders. He has bought from his friends and favorites without making contracts, paying them whatever they charged. No system of books or vouchers has been kept, and everything has been run loosely and without business rules.

The Secretary of the Navy has ordered Rear-Admiral Wyman, commanding the North Atlantic fleet, to immediately send one vessel of his squadron to Merida, Mexico, where the American bark Acacia, which put into port in distress, is reported to have been unjustly seized by the Mexican authorities. The Captain and crew are not allowed to remain on the vessel, and the American consul's request for her surrender is unheeded. The matter will be left in the care of naval officers. This is the first case under the new administration calling for armed interference to maintain the honor of our flag in a foreign land.
