James Bice, the burglar, has been held in \$1000 bonds to await the action of the Grand Jury.

H. H. Hyde, an old citizen of Prairie City, Eastern Oregon, died at his home in that place on the 8th instant of paralysis.

The Baptist Church building in this city is to be enlarged, its present seating capacity being insufficient to hold the audiences.

An insect of some kind has been destroying wheat in Yamhill county at a fearful rate, cutting the stalk off at the surface of the ground.

John Sullivan, who was stabbed by a man named Stoughton at McGraw's Landing last week, died at St. Vincent's Hospital on Saturday.

It is thought that the wheat crop east of the Cascade Mountains will this year be nearly 100,000 tons, of which 75,000 tons will be exported.

The city seems to be infested at present with a gang of desperadoes, as burglaries and attempted incendiaries have become quite common of late.

A largely attended, harmonious and interesting session of the Congregational Association of Oregon and Washington was held at Salem this week.

The formation of a new fire and marine insurance company, with a capital of \$250,000, is in contemplation by a number of capitalists in this city.

The marriage of Mr. Will Gilmore, of Heppner, and Miss Emma Peck, of Portland, was solemnized at Milwaukie yesterday, Rev. Mr. Sellwood officiating.

Mr. M. L. Hallenbeck, the revivalist, returned to the city yesterday and conducted the services at the Y. M. C. A. Hall last evening, a large audience being in attendance.

Freiman & Smith have purchased the Pine-street coffee-house, and will hereafter run it in connection with the Vienna coffee-house, which has become so popular under their management.

The Standard says that the O. R. & N. Co. will proceed immediately with the work of bridging the Willamette at the upper end of Ross' Island, the lumber having been already ordered for that purpose.

The track on the City View Farm is being put in excellent condition for the Northwestern District Agricultural Association, preparatory for the races which will commence next Tuesday, the 26th inst.

A resolution was introduced in the Council last Thursday evening asking Chief Justice Lord to settle the disputed question of the Mayoralty. It is very probable, however, that he will decline the thankless responsibility.

Captain James Harvey, of the British ship Taunton, plead guilty in the U. S. District Court last week to the charge of violating the law by bringing more Chinese passengers to this port than is allowable, and was fined \$700.

The pastors of the different churches, and all interested, are cordially invited to be present. Good music and a few short speeches will be had.
