The internal revenue collections for this district during August were \$3963.69, three-fifths of the amount being for beer stamps.

Thomas Pace, a young man who has been employed as second cook on the steamer S. G. Reed, died suddenly of heart disease at the Cascades on Sunday night.

The City Auditor has filed the long list of certified papers ordered by Judge Stott in the Mayoralty case of Simon vs. Thompson. They comprise 650 pages of foolscap.

The body of Jules Vivarez, a cook at the Esmond, was found floating in the Willamette on Monday. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning.

Mr. J. F. Cache, of the Lafayette Register, was in the city last Friday and gave the NEW NORTHWEST a call. He will soon be connected with the Standard of this city.

On Tuesday large and earnest prayer-meetings were held in the Taylor-street Church and the Y. M. C. A. Hall, when applications were offered for the recovery of President Garfield.

There are many signers in this city to the one-cent subscription fund for the benefit of Captain Cook, of Cincinnati, who slapped the face of a man for expressing the hope that the President would die, and was fined for assault and battery.

The pupils in attendance at the public schools on the opening day (last Thursday) numbered 2241, divided as follows: High, 184; Central, 551; Harrison, 689; North, 584; Park Primary, 233. One year ago the number was exactly 2000.

The eighth annual report of the City Superintendent of the public schools of Portland for the year ending June 23rd, 1881, has just been issued in pamphlet form. The reports of the Board of School Directors and the School Clerk to the annual meeting held March 7th, 1881, are also given. The receipt of a copy is acknowledged.

The Committee on Health and Police of the Common Council has under consideration several rules suggested by Mayor Thompson in relation to the appointment of policemen. He wants more intelligence, higher morals and better physique in the force.

Mr. E. W. Durkee, of the firm of Edes & Durkee, of Salem, was in the city yesterday on his way to The Dalles, where he and his family will reside in the future. He goes to establish a manufactory of the well-known woven wire mattresses. The firm has already a large contract to fill.

The Grand Jury has found a true bill against Jack Powers, who killed Ben Cornelius on the Fourth of July, charging him with murder in the first degree. He was arraigned in the Circuit Court yesterday and pleaded not guilty. The trial was set for Monday, the 19th instant.

Rev. Dr. Alexander Rosensplitz, of Nashville, Tenn., who enjoys the reputation of being a fine theologian, a ripe scholar and an eloquent speaker, has favorably answered a call to the Synagogue Beth Israel, of this city. He preached to the congregation on Saturday last for the first time.

On last Saturday night a number of buildings on Front and Columbia were destroyed by fire, which was undoubtedly of incendiary origin. Losses are as follows: C. A. Francis, brass works, \$1300; insurance, \$800. M. F. Mulkey, \$2000; insurance, \$1000. J. Killeen, \$800; Mr. Wallace, \$500.

On Monday evening, as Dr. James Dickson was walking along Yamhill street, near Second, he suffered a fracture of the jaw bone from a stone wildly hurled by an unknown man at some Chinaman with whom the stranger was having a wrangle. The doctor cannot identify the man who struck him.
