Slaughter of American Sheep.

American sheep are still going to the market in vast numbers. August, 1894, was known as virtually a panic month, so great was the rush of sheep into the Chicago market; yet the report for August, 1895, shows an increase of 40,000 head over that of the corresponding month the preceding year, while an excess of 3,000 for the first week in September indicates that the haste to sell is still an uppermost feature. Under these conditions many Western sheep men have sold out almost every one, two or three year old sheep in their flocks, so that now their stock is at the point of certain deterioration.—Breeder's Gazette.
