Sunday Sermon. Rev. G. W. Kennedy preached a fine sermon Sunday. The subject of his discourse was "Bible Holiness, Practicable and Attainable." He presented as the basis of his discourse the following Scriptural words, "I beseech you present yourselves a living sacrifice, holy acceptable to God." In elucidating his subject, he referred to the ancient time of offering sacrifices upon the altar, contrasting the same with man's making a sacrifice of self to serve the living and true God. A man in making such sacrifice is no more his own, but belongs to God and necessarily must consecrate himself to his service, and press on to holiness of life in all things, and then he will enjoy an eternity of joy and happiness in the eternal world. It was not the external and material body that was to be made a sacrifice, but the whole man, body, soul and spirit, which if given to the service of God, constituted a holiness of life that would receive his reward. Nothing was unreasonable in man, when he gave himself entirely to God, and acted in accordance with the divine spirit. The sermon was eloquent, and delivered with much earnestness and the audience seemed spellbound by his utterances as he presented his thoughts in glowing words, proving the conclusiveness of the arguments he advanced in support of the position he occupied with regard to Bible holiness. The copper mine company in Josephine county is preparing to construct a wire suspension bridge across the Illinois river immediately. The structure will have 150 feet span, and will be anchored firmly to either bank of the river. It will be wide enough for a loaded team. There are now 388 convicts in the state penitentiary at Salem. The records show, says the Oregonian, that 237 were received during the past year; 127 for larceny; 23 for burglary; 17 for assault with a dangerous weapon, and 12 for forgery. Those committed for other crimes were not given. A number of our citizens are feeling quite indignant because their premises have been searched for Saml. G. Brown, the escaped convict. This ill feeling against the officers ought not to exist. They were only doing what the laws provide for when, by rumor or otherwise, they may have reason to believe that a criminal may have secreted himself upon any citizen's premises.
