We demand the re-enactment of the mortgage tax-law, with provision for the exemption of actual indebtedness. We demand the abolition of the railroad commission, the game and fish commission, the food and dairy commission, and the horticulture commission. We demand that not more than \$10,000 per annum be appropriated for the maintenance of the Oregon National Guard. We oppose the appropriation of any money for the support or maintenance of any normal or high school, or for the support in any way of the state university, or the state agricultural college, or the state or district fairs.

We demand that the expenses of running the office of county clerk, the office of the sheriff and treasurer, school superintendent and judge be reduced as follows: That the county clerk be allowed but one deputy, that the salary of the clerk be \$1500 per annum, that the salary of the deputy clerk be \$800. That the salary of the Sheriff be \$2500 per annum and no more, that the sheriff be allowed one deputy at a salary not to exceed \$1000, that the salary of the treasurer be \$900, that the assessor's salary be \$1200 and that the employment of assistant or deputy assessors be under the control and supervision of the county commissioners court, that the salary of the county judge be \$900 and that the salary of the school superintendent shall be \$800 and that said \$800 shall be in full compensation for all services performed by said superintendent.

That our representatives on the legislative ticket are hereby pledged to the introduction in the next legislative assembly, of bills in accordance with the foregoing declaration, and to the use of every honorable means to secure the passage of the same. Respectfully submitted,

**THE TICKET.**  
"It is the ticket" that will win. It was made in harmony, several strong candidates giving way to their competitors without murmuring. Out of the multitude of aspirants it was impossible to suit every one. Some one necessarily must give way. But as a rule the delegate method of selecting candidates is the most satisfactory that can be devised for selecting candidates as the choice of a party. In the convention, Friday, out of 99 delegates elected at the primaries there were but 6 proxies. The convention, as a whole, made an excellent ticket and was quite equally distributed over the county. At the head of the ticket is Hon. A. W. Reed from Gardiner for state senator. Coming up the Umpqua Valley, Mr. M. D. Thompson of Scottsburg for commissioner, Hon. J. T. Bridges of Drain for representative at the north end of the county, Hon. G. W. Riddle at the south end and Hon. A. M. Crawford in the middle—Roseburg. Daye Shambrook from Coles Valley for sheriff, W. S. Britt of Riddle for assessor. Mr. W. P. Heydon, for surveyor from Coles Valley. W. A. Frater, though now of Roseburg, came from Ten Mile when first elected. Mr. Shupe was for years a resident of Oakland before his appointment to the land office. O. C. Brown of Roseburg, for school superintendent, until quite recently was a resident of Deer Creek. K. L. Miller of Roseburg, for coroner. So much as to locality of candidates. Let us consider then as to their being able, honest and faithful. At the head of our ticket is Hon. A. W. Reed, a thorough business man who will carry business into legislative work on true business principles. A man who has managed his own business successfully is qualified to manage that of others entrusted to him. As to his honesty and integrity, the high esteem of the community of which he forms a conspicuous part is proof of that. Then he has pledged himself, by accepting the nomination of the convention, to indorse and work to carry out the measures embraced in the resolutions which the convention adopted.
