THE TICKET.

For county clerk Hon. J. H. Shupe was nominated. Mr. Shupe is an old citizen of Douglas and is well known that anything commendable by us would be superfluous. He has been state senator and register of the United States land office in this city and will be the next county clerk of Douglas county.

David R. Shambrook, deputy under Sheriff C. F. Cathcart, has been nominated for sheriff. Mr. Shambrook is a Douglas county boy, born and reared in Coles Valley, and is identified with the material interests of the county. Young, energetic and attentive to business, and if elected—and he will be—will make a good sheriff.

W. A. Frater, the present incumbent, has been renominated for county treasurer. Mr. Frater has conducted the business of the office so satisfactorily since he took charge of the office that he was unanimously proclaimed the choice of the convention for re-election.

W. S. Britt of Riddle was named for assessor. Mr. Britt is a man of middle age, of ripe experience in business, a good judge of property, able, conscientious and faithful in the discharge of his known duties. He is now a farmer and feels the great necessity of equalization of tax burthens.

The convention did well in placing the name of M. D. Thompson on the ticket for county commissioner. Mr. Thompson is a man of ripe age for active business, such as is required to look after and guard the peoples' financial affairs, and still broad minded enough to perceive opportunities for improving the county's condition, and backbone enough to stand for the right.

Hon. O. C. Brown, a young man of considerable experience as a teacher in our public schools, is named for county school superintendent. Mr. Brown stands high as a teacher, holding a life diploma. He has taught in the public schools of this county for ten years and is one of our best educators.

W. P. Heydon, the present county surveyor, has been named to succeed himself—as he will—as a man past middle age, but full of virile vigor yet and will devote to the office his best efforts to do good and efficient work. Honest, able and faithful in the future as in the past, we commend him to the voters next June for their endorsement, as they doubtless will.

Now we come to the finale of a county ticket, the coroner; a position few men are as there is "nothing in it" in a financial way. It is an important position none the less as the coroner takes the place of a sheriff in certain contingencies. The convention placed Dr. E. L. Miller, the present incumbent, on the ticket for this office. He has satisfactorily performed his duties during the past two years and will do so two years longer.

We do not as a rule refer to the claims of candidates before the convention who failed in securing the nomination, always deferring our individual judgment to the concurring opinions of the many. But in the case of Mr. Cathcart who failed in securing the nomination for sheriff, though possessing an acknowl-

ledged high order of ability, a train of unfortunate circumstances culminated in causing his defeat, viz: the escape of Sam Brown from jail twice while Mr. Cathcart was sheriff. The first escape was through the negligence of a deputy. Mr. Cathcart being in no wise responsible. The second escape was effected by a damnable conspiracy of a large number of Brown's friends, as the trial of the Pools showed. Brown was furnished by outsiders with the means of escape and after his escape he was secreted and spirited away by his friends, who kept watch of the sheriff and posse and kept him posted as to their movements.

While the Review has been working with might and main to secure Mr. Cathcart's nomination, it has been manufacturing political thunder to hurl at him, and had he been nominated, the Review would then have unlimbered its masked battery upon him. And now that Mr. Shambrook, his deputy, has secured the nomination, the Review will turn its batteries today upon him, and deal out hypocritical and fulsome praise of Mr. Cathcart. Mark our predictions.

HERMANN'S OPPONENTS.

The opponents of Mr. Hermann are reduced to great straits when they resort to garbling his dispatches and making them say what he did not say, while at his post of duty, and thus in his absence traduce him for the purpose of getting his place. The following dispatches from Mr. Hermann show what falsehoods they will descend to make a point:

WASHINGTON, D. C., 8:30 A. M., March 22, 1896.—Hon. F. M. Wilkins, Eugene, Or.: I have secured a large allowance for the Siuslaw jetty work. An early adjournment of congress is assured and will make money for the appropriation available at an early date, which will make it possible to resume work on the jetty in the near future.

BINGER HERMANN.
WASHINGTON, D. C., 9:11 A. M., March 25, 1896.—To Hon. F. M. Wilkins, Eugene, Or.: I have succeeded in securing the great project for immediately and permanently improving the Willamette river from Eugene to Portland. The improvement work will be contracted.

Mark you, Mr. Hermann does not say he has had the bill passed. "In the dispatch dated March 22d he says: "I have secured a large allowance for Siuslaw jetty work."

As a member of the river and harbor committee he had secured the placing in the river and harbor bill the needed appropriations, and so wired Mr. Wilkins. One D. M. C. Gault, who is a tool in the hands of his boss, asked Senator McBride if such a bill had been passed appropriating money for the purposes named.

McBride replied on April 1st, that no such bill had passed the house, but that the committee report was "expected this week." The report was sent to the house April 3d, and verities Hermann's telegrams to Wilkins in every particular, and will doubtless be passed in due time. This attempt on the part of the Oregonian and the valley papers to convict Hermann of sending out false dispatches to deceive the people, fails to accomplish its purpose, for the bill is now before the house, and exposes the trick, and likewise the infamy of the schemers.

FAIR DEALING.

If there is any one thing that an honest man admires above another in politics it is fair dealing. Trickiness is despised by every man who has any nobility in his make up. The Plaindealer most emphatically condemns this contemptible trickery. Sooner or later it will become known and the trickster will become an object of contempt.

At the democratic primaries Saturday prominent democrats of long years of loyalty to the party, men of honesty and sterling integrity informed us that the men who have been bossing party nominations for years, were at their old job, and that through trickery and party bulldozing had deprived many democrats favoring Finis Dillard for sheriff from voting at the primaries. This was effected in part by the anti-Dillard men seizing the polls before the hour appointed and choosing their own men for chairman and clerk; and then after fixing the time for closing, actually did close half an hour before the time fixed for closing, thus shutting off any one who might offer his vote less than half an hour before the time set for closing. As the result would not have been materially different from what it is, the conduct of the bosses showed plainly what they were determined to do if necessary to accomplish their object, viz: to down Mr. Dillard.

We print a certificate of a life long democrat, in today's issue showing that Mr. Hershey offered to vote in Unspung precinct and was promptly denied unless he would pledge himself to vote next June for the regular democratic nominees.
