REPUBLICAN STATE PLATFORM.

Following is the platform adopted by the republican state convention held at Portland last week:
The representatives of the republicans of the state of Oregon in convention assembled, call attention to the condition of industry throughout the country, as a proof of the necessity of returning to the policy of the republican party under which there was general prosperity during thirty years.
We reaffirm the principles of the republican platform of 1892, and assert that the results that have followed the change decreed by the election of that year have justified our protest against the national policy adopted by the democratic party.
We believe that the government should have an ample revenue, with a sufficient surplus over ordinary expenditures to provide for coast defence, for the steady building up of the navy, and for the constant reduction of the public debt. We believe that the present tariff, with its lowered rates and its destructive and dishonest system of under-valuations and discriminations as to localities, should be replaced by one framed on protective principles similar to that of the McKinley bill and arranged to give ample protection to American wages and American industry, and to restore the reciprocity policy of James G. Blaine.
We have always given protection to our shipbuilders. In late years we have neglected to protect our shipowners. We believe the time has come to return to the policy of Washington and Hamilton, which, by discriminating duties in favor of American bottoms, secured 90 per cent of our carrying trade to American ships, and which, if now restored, would again revive our shipping and cause American freights to be paid to Americans.
The American people, from tradition and interest, favor bimetalism, and the republican party demands the use of both gold and silver as standard money with such restrictions and under such provisions to be determined by legislation, as will secure the maintenance of the party of values of the two metals, so that the purchasing and debt-paying power of the dollar, whether of silver, gold or paper, shall be at all times equal.
The interests of the producers of the country—its farmers and its working-

men—demand that every dollar, paper or coin, issued by the government shall be as good as any other dollar.
Resolved, That we earnestly endorse the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States, providing for the election of the United States senators by popular vote, recently reported from the committee on privileges and elections by Senator Mitchell and now pending consideration in the United States.
Resolved, That the application of the Oregon delegation in congress to the president of the United States and now pending before him, praying a modification of his proclamation creating the Cascade forest reserve, is hereby earnestly approved, and we appeal to the president to grant the prayer of our delegation in congress.
We realize the importance and magnitude of the fishing industry on the Columbia river and would recommend that some provisions be made for a state hatchery, for artificial propagation, and that the laws regulating the close season be rigidly enforced.
That we endorse the efforts of our representatives in congress to secure repayment to the settlers of Oregon of the excess of \$1 25 per acre wrongfully collected by the government on lands located in the limits of the unearned Northern Pacific Railroad land grant now forfeited.
The construction of the Nicaragua canal is of the highest importance to the American people, both as a measure of national defense and to build up and maintain American commerce. It is moreover of special importance to our Pacific states and we demand its completion as speedily as possible by the government of the United States.
We hereby endorse the action of our senators and representatives in congress in their endeavor to secure grants of pensions to Indian War Veterans.
We pledge the republican party to a rigid economy in the expenditure of public money; to the reduction of excessive salaries; and the abolishment of the fee system wherever possible, and of all useless commissions; and believe that no appropriation should be made to any school or charitable institution not under the control of the state; and oppose the incorporation into the general appropriation bill of items for the expenditure of public money not authorized by law.
We demand the enactment of rigid restrictions on foreign immigration, both for protection of our country against illiterate and vicious classes from foreign lands and for protection of our own people of the remainder of our national domain.
We commend the policy of the republican party in relation to internal improvements, and in particular in opening our waterways to commerce, and we denounce the illiberality of the democratic party in these important matters.

Simon Goes Under Again.
Defeated again as usual. The Oregonian has met with a repulse in its effort to bolster up Joe Simon. The Hume-Carey faction are now in the lead by one majority. General George H. If this be so, as reported, Joe Simon, the Oregonian man, goes down to rise no more till he bolts up in a new race.

Another Pioneer Gone.
Died, in this city, April 12th, 1896, at 3:20 p. m., D. C. McClallen, aged 96 years, 9 months and 16 days.
David C. McClallen, the subject of this memoir, was born in Essex, Vermont, October 27, 1829, and arrived at Milwaukee, Wis., and was united in marriage with Miss Electa Burdick, October 1, 1857. They then went to Champagne county, Illinois, where they resided two years. From Illinois they came to Oregon and settled in Oakland, June 1, 1859, where they resided seven years, then removed to Canyonville, this county, and engaged in the hotel business for about two and a half years. They then came to Roseburg and engaged in the hotel business for most of the time since. Mr. and Mrs. McClallen are widely known all over this state as artists in hotel management. The traveling public will learn of Mr. McClallen's death with deep regret, as he was one of the most popular hotel keepers on this coast, noted for his genial and accommodating spirit, ever mindful of the comfort and convenience of his guests while under his roof, in which his surviving companion on life's stormy sea took a deep interest and contrived greatly to his marked success in the business to which they were so well adapted.
During their residence in Douglas county there were born to them eight children, only two now survive, Harry T., and Roy just entering upon his majority. Mr. McClallen has been in poor health for about two years, caused by a disease of the kidneys. The immediate cause of his death was a stroke of apoplexy. He was up and about to within three hours of his death, conversing as usual in his proverbial pleasant manner. But that fell destroyer, Death, came at an unexpected moment and struck down this old pioneer, and carried sorrow into the family circle and startled the community with its sudden and unexpected finale.
The funeral will take place tomorrow from the residence at 2 p. m. The remains will be laid at rest in the family grounds at the Old Fellow's cemetery beside his children gone before. So ends the busy life of David C. McClallen, one of the noted pioneers of Douglas county.

The Pulpit.
Rev. G. W. Kennedy of the M. E. Church, discoursed from Mat. xvi; 3 Sunday evening to a tolerably well filled house. He spoke from manuscript and in a very deliberate manner. As an introduction to his sermon he stated that opinions are good for nothing unless backed up by authority. He referred to social, political and religious opinions, the latter, he said, are backed up by the authority of God's word—the Bible.
The speaker then laid down the proposition, "As is the religion of a nation so is the nation." He then referred historically to Pagan religions, the Jewish and later to the Christian religion as examples to prove his proposition. He claimed the religion which God gave the Hebrews was perfect and had the Hebrews kept the commandments given them through the prophets, they would have been a perfect nation. The Jewish people were governed by a theocracy, laws given them direct from God, and if observed they would have been prosperous and happy. A superstitious and cruel religion make a cruel people, he said. The Pagan governments of Greece and Rome, though better than any other pagan government which was built on a false religion went down.
He asked the student of history: Where are we? While we have the pure and perfect system of religion of Christ we are slaughtering, through the rum power, more people every year than the massacre of the Armenians by the cruel Kurds. This Christian nation, he said, is spending \$50 for liquor to one for the churches. The churches, he said must save this nation—they hold the balance of power in the government. The church, he said, makes the home, the home makes the school and the school makes the nation. He then closed with a feeling peroration, charging the churches, by their apathy in reformatory work, with being the greatest hindrance to the nation's progress. A true theology is the nation's only hope.

The Turf.
Engene is to have one of the most interesting race meetings from the 20th to the 23d of May inclusive, of all the North Pacific circuit. The Association, headed by Hon. S. H. Friendley as president, have offered \$3000 in purses. Among the one hundred horses now in training there, there are Smith Bailey's trotters, "Winchester," "Jake," and several youngsters; W. W. Cardwell's runners, "Free Coinage" and "Black Alder," all of Roseburg. Wm. McMullen is handling Mr. Bailey's horses and J. D. Parker is training for Mr. Cardwell. Douglas county ought to get a slice of that \$3000. Roseburg should build a good winter track and join the circuit next season. Nothing circulates a few dollars more rapidly than a company of horsemen, with large stables of horses.
