## HURRAH FOR MCKINLEY!

Wm. McKinley was nominated on the first ballot, receiving 457 1/2 votes. The convention is wild with enthusiasm over the result.

Good bye to Teller. He has mounted the free silver hobby that has rocked him out of the party without leaving a lock of his hair for a memento of his having once been a stalwart of the G. O. P.

At 2 p. m., Roseburg time, Foraker nominated Wm. McKinley in one of his eloquent and impetuous speeches, amidst an outburst of enthusiasm by the convention. Thurston seconded the nomination of McKinley. The convention sang "The Star Spangled Banner."

If the friends of Protection would always read republican papers, that favor a policy of protection, they would learn the truth about republican politics. This would result in less fretting and quarreling among republicans, who are often set at loggerheads by the intentional misrepresentations of democratic papers, made for the sole purpose of creating dissension in republican ranks. Democracy and discord are synonymous.

Senator Teller of Colorado has made a strong effort to have the St. Louis Convention adopt his free silver resolution as a substitute for the gold standard plank in the platform, but failed. He was listened to with marked attention during his speech. He claimed that the progress of the country depended on recognizing free coinage of silver. He said it is as important a question as whether we should have two flags. The convention favors a plank demanding restriction of immigration to those who can read and write.

### A CLEAN CUT ISSUE.

The presidential issue will be chiefly fought on the tariff issue as between parties. Thousands of people, democrats as well as republicans, will stand solid for protection on the republican ticket, although in favor of free silver, secondarily.

There are other issues of vital importance that will be potent factors in the campaign. The restriction of foreign immigration and the enforcement of the Monroe doctrine will come in for their share of consideration. Also the Nicaragua canal question will play no inconsiderable part. From our dispatches from St. Louis, it is learned that the financial plank is for a gold basis, that a restriction of foreign immigration to those who can read and write has been fixed upon. The protection plank is a foregone conclusion as the distinctive measure of the republican party.

These three planks, viz: The gold standard, protection to American industries and the restriction of foreign immigration will appeal to the American with a consideration paramount to all others, and on these vital principles it cannot fail to win popular favor.

The convention opposes the appropriation of public money for sectarian purposes, favors liberal pensions and interposition for peace in Cuba.

These additional planks will add strength to the ticket.

### THE MCKINLEY IDEA.

It has been held against Mr. McKinley that he is a man with but one idea—the idea of Protection. What is he? What is the McKinley "idea"? It is an American "idea" throughout. Mr. McKinley has not one public thought or sentiment ever in his mind that is not imbued with Americanism. And we have had too little Americanism of late, far too little. The one issue before the people today is the issue of Protection to all American interests. Our mines, our forests, our fisheries, our manufactures and our agriculture, all need a strong touch of the American "idea." The people are demanding a restoration of the American "idea" of 1890, and who so able to give it to them as Mr. McKinley? With the Tariff issue to be met, with reciprocity to be re-established, with the problem of Orient-

tal competition confronting us, to what other leader can the people naturally turn rather than to McKinley? It is his "idea" they want, his American "idea" of America for Americans. There is no man in the United States today who is more bitterly hated in England than McKinley. That fact alone is proof that he is the best man for president of the United States. Why are the democratic papers so opposed to his receiving the republican nomination? Simply because they know that he is a thorough American, and the history of the present Democratic administration in its every line shows un-Americanism. The people have had too much of this, therefore they have risen with one voice to demand a restoration of the American "idea," and with it, they demand the man who represents that "idea."

### CONVENTION NEWS.

St. Louis, June 17.—When the reading clerk, in reading the committee report, announced that John M. Thurston, of Nebraska, would be permanent chairman, there was an eruption of flags and cheers from the delegates. A demonstration also greeted the name of U. S. Grant, of California. Sewell, of New Jersey, and Congressman Sereno Payne, of New York, were designated to escort the permanent chairman to the platform. They marched down the aisle while the delegates jumped to their feet and fluttered flags and handkerchiefs and cheered shrilly with a yell that reminded the Southerners of the Confederacy.

Fairbanks, with a plume of national tricolor pinned to the breast of his black frock coat, stepped to the front, meeting the trio and grasped the Nebraskan by the hand. Thurston faced the arena with hands clasped behind him and began to speak. He said:

"Gentlemen of the Convention: This happy memory of your kindness and confidence will abide in my grateful memory forever. My sole ambition is to meet your expectations, and I pledge myself to exercise the important powers of this high office with absolute impartiality. I beseech your cordial co-operation and support to the end that our proceedings may be orderly and dignified as befits a deliberation of the supreme council of the republican party."

"Eight years ago I had the distinguished honor to preside over the convention which nominated the last republican president of the United States. Today, I have the further distinguished honor to preside over the convention which is to nominate the next president of the United States."

"This generation has had its object lesson, and the doom of democracy is already pronounced. The American people will return the republican party to power because they know its administration will mean the supremacy of the constitution of the United States, maintenance of the law, protection of every American citizen in his right to live, labor and vote, vigorous foreign policy, enforcement of the Monroe doctrine, restoration of our merchant marine, safety under the stars and stripes on every sea, in every port, revenue adequate for all government expenditures and a gradual extinguishment of the national debt."

"Currency as sound as the government and as unimpaired as its honor, whose dollars, whether of gold, silver or paper, shall have an equal purchasing and debt-paying power with the best dollars of the civilized world, a protective tariff which protects, coupled with reciprocity which reciprocates, by securing the best market for our products and opening American factories to the free coinage of American muscle, a pension policy just and generous to our living heroes and to widows and orphans of their dead comrades."

"Governmental supervision and control of transportation lines and rates, protecting the people from all unlawful combination and unjust action of aggregated capital and corporate power. An American welcome to every God-fearing, liberty-loving, constitution-respecting, law-abiding laborer, decent man. Exclusion of all whose birth, whose blood, whose condition, whose teaching, whose practices would menace the permanency of our free institutions, endanger safety of the American people, or lessen the opportunities of American labor."

"Abolition of sectionalism. Every star in the American flag shining for the honor and welfare and happiness of every commonwealth and of all people, deathless loyalty to all truly American, and patriotism as eternal as the stars."

### Another Pioneer.

Joel T. Thompson, an old bachelor, died June 16 at the house of T. Whitsett, aged about 70 years, of heart disease accompanied with dropsy. Mr. Thompson was born in Schuyler county, Illinois, near the town of Littleton. He emigrated to California in 1850 and continued to reside there, engaged in mining, till 1859. He then came to Douglas county, Oregon and engaged in stock-raising on Roberts creek. He was an old pioneer companion of Judge J. S. Fitzhugh of this city. His older brother, James D., was supposed to have been killed by the cars near Sacramento, California, last spring while on his way to visit his brother Joel T. From Judge Fitzhugh we learn the deceased was one of God's noblemen, a just and upright man and always had many friends wherever he sojourned. He was buried yesterday. Illinois papers please copy.

## TELEGRAPH NEWS

Earthquake in Japan.

YOKOHAMA, June 17.—News of a terrible earthquake, involving the loss of over a thousand lives, has reached here from the island of Yesso, which contains the northern provinces of Japan, including Shirebese, Oshima, Furi, Hitaka, Tokachi, Ishikari, Kirschiro, Teishiro, Kilami and Nemoro. All these sections of the island seem to be in a more or less shaken condition.

The subterranean disturbance lasted about 20 hours, and during that period the utmost terror prevailed.

Ground rumblings are described as resembling the roar of distant cannon. Shock followed shock almost in uninterrupted succession. In all it was estimated that 150 shocks occurred. It is impossible at present to give accurate details of the disaster, as communication between the mainland of Japan and the island of Yesso, from which the former is separated by the Straits of Tsugaru Saigari, is interrupted, or more likely, in the hands of the authorities.

The whole town of Kumaishi, however, is reported as destroyed by a tidal wave, which accompanied the earthquake. The island of Yesso has in the past had several similar visitations, and contains a number of active and extinct volcanoes.

Rumor has it that the number of lives lost and the damage done is far in excess of the figures contained in the first dispatch. A full official report has been asked for and is expected shortly. It is feared that disasters to shipping must have resulted from the tidal wave.

### Beginning To Pack.

Portland Telegram, June 17.

Things are quieting down at Astoria, according to a dispatch to The Telegram from the seat of war this afternoon. The militia is encamped in the custom-house and courthouse yard, and have not been molested.

There is less talk of strife and less suffering about a "45-cent militia," and more evidences of business. The benefit of the presence of the soldiers is beginning to be evidenced by the resumption of operations by all the lower river canneries. The fishermen are going to work unmolested.

A petition was circulated in Astoria last evening asking for the withdrawal of the militia. The petition excited no attention among the citizens of the town.

The dispatch to this paper this afternoon says that large numbers of men are getting ready to go to work. It says: "Most of the fish now being packed are brought from the upper river, but each cannery reports this morning that their gill net men are gradually giving out, and there is every prospect that before many days all men who want to fish will be openly drifting on all sections of the river. The large quantity of fish now coming over from Baker's bay are being caught by gill-net men, whereas up to two days ago there was not a gill net in the water below Tongue point."

A private letter received from a militiaman says they are comfortably encamped, but that they are experiencing some little difficulty in accustoming themselves to hardtack, coffee and canned beef.

Forty rounds of ammunition were distributed to each of the men before the Harriet Queen landed at Astoria.

By tomorrow it is thought between 200 and 300 fishermen will be operating their nets. Sensational rumors were published in the morning paper of an attempt by the influential cannerymen to bribe the fishermen to compromise and go to work at 45 cents.
