The weather flags displayed represent the forecast applying to the 24 hours ending at 8 a. m. to-morrow. (If more than one kind of weather is predicted for that period, the conditions first named in the forecast will be represented by the uppermost weather flag.) A white flag indicates clear or fair weather; a blue flag, rain or snow. The flag of which the upper half is white and the lower half blue, local rain or snow. A black triangular pennant indicates the temperature and when displayed above a weather flag indicates warmer, and when displayed below, cooler. The temperature flag is never displayed alone. Its absence indicates stationary temperature. The cold wave flag, white with black square in the center, when displayed on the Pacific coast, indicates frost.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY.

On Wednesday, June 17th, occurred the fiftyth anniversary of the marriage of two of Douglas county's most respected and honored citizens, John M. Wright and his most estimable wife. The occasion was celebrated and made peculiarly pleasant by the presence at the home of these good people in Roseburg, of all the seven children who have been born to them, all of whom are highly respected and honored by a large circle of acquaintances and friends.

John Merritt Wright was born June 12, 1826, in Kanawha county, West Virginia. He removed with his parents to Missouri in April, 1844, where he met Emily Simmons, who became his wife June 17, 1846. Mrs. Wright was born in Howard county, Missouri on April 20, 1830. They came to Oregon in 1852 and settled in Flournoy valley in Douglas county. Shortly afterwards they located in French Settlement, where they resided until 1889, when they removed to Roseburg where they now reside. Mr. Wright joined the Baptist church, in 1845 and his wife two years later and both have remained consistent and faithful members since that time. They have been remarkably fortunate in their children not only in the fact that all have grown to manhood and womanhood, but in the further and more important fact that all have become useful and honorable members of society. W. T. Wright, the oldest of the children, is one of our most respected and influential business men and is cashier of the First National Bank. Calvin W. Wright is also one of Roseburg's well known and prominent citizens. L. S. Wright, lives at Portland where he has been for a number of years connected with the post office department. Of the daughters, Rowena L. married Joseph Jones. They now reside in Spokane, Washington, where they are engaged in business. Missouri Ann became the wife of L. T. Thompson of Coles Valley, one of Douglas county's most prominent and successful farmers. They have lived on their present farm for 28 years and are known far and near for their sterling worth as citizens and neighbors. Alice G. married John Van Boren, who was at one time sheriff of Douglas county. Mrs. Van Boren is now a widow and lives in Roseburg, where she is recognized as a successful business woman, prominent in social circles and highly respected. Emily Merritt is the wife of our esteemed fellow townsman D. S. West. Dave and Merritt are well known to the people of Roseburg and Douglas county, both being prominent in church and society, as well as in business circles. In addition to the seven children above mentioned, Mr. and Mrs. Wright have 35 grand children and six great grand children. We join with many neighbors and friends of these worthy old pioneers in congratulations, and in the hope that they may long be spared to encourage others to emulate them in lives of honesty and christian citizenship.
