Appalling Array of Figures.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 24.—The failure of Spain to conquer the Cuban patriots, besides being proved by the continuous defeats of the troops in the field of battle, the lack of money in her treasury and public credit she enjoys, is also as plainly seen by the supreme effort made in sending money, men and war material to Cuba since the beginning of the struggle, with such poor success. In March, 1895, Spain sent to Cuba \$500,000; in April, \$400,000; in May, \$1,521,000; in June, \$1,800,000; in July, \$700,000; in August, \$1,600,000; in September, \$1,400,000; in October, \$700,000; in November, \$1,700,000; in December, \$1,000,000; in January, 1896, \$2,900,000; in February, \$3,000,000; a total of \$19,321,000.

In Teller's Behalf.

CHICAGO, June 24.—Senator Thomas Carter, of Montana, arrived in the city yesterday, and left in the evening for Washington. He held a long consultation with Senator Lee Mantle, which is said to have dealt with the prospects of securing an endorsement of Senator Teller's candidacy at the approaching democratic convention. Senator Carter said in case the democrats put up a man whom the silver people could conscientiously support, Senator Teller would probably withdraw. He declined to say what course he would follow remarking that events would shape that.

Corbett-Sharkey Battle. SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—Everything is in readiness for the contest tonight between Champion Corbett and Sharkey, the heavyweight from the Mare-Island navy-yard. While it is expected that Corbett will obtain the decision, which is to be based on scientific points, and on the condition of each man at the close of the contest, there is considerable difference of opinion as to whether the champion will be able to knock out the marine. Corbett himself says he does not know whether he can put the sailor to sleep in four rounds, but says he will try to do so. The betting on the knockout proposition is 10 to 8 in favor of Sharkey.

Populists Are Preparing. St. Louis, June 24.—J. H. McDowell, of Union City, Tenn., sergeant-at-arms of the people's party national convention, which will convene in this city July 22, arrived in this city last night. He will establish himself in the people's party headquarters on the fifth floor of the Commercial building, for the ensuing week, after which he will go to the convention hall. Eugene Smith, first assistant sergeant-at-arms, will be here from Chicago about July 15.
