The weather flag displayed represent the forecast applying to the 24 hours ending at 5 a. m. to-morrow. (If more than one kind of weather is predicted for that period, the conditions first named in the forecast will be represented by the uppermost weather flag.) A white flag indicates clear or fair weather; a blue flag, rain or snow. The flag of the upper half is white and the lower half blue, local rain or snow. A black triangular pennant indicates the temperature and when displayed above a weather flag indicates warmer, and when displayed below, cooler. The temperature flag is never displayed alone. Its absence indicates stationary temperature. The cold wave flag, white with black square in the center, when displayed on the Pacific coast, indicates frost.
