A black triangular pennant indicates the temperature and when displayed above a weather flag indicates warmer, and when displayed below, cooler. The temperature flag is never displayed alone. Its absence indicates stationary temperature. The cold wave flag, white with black square in the center, when displayed on the Pacific coast, indicates frost.

The Fourth.

About fifty of Douglas county's citizens have gone to Portland to celebrate. On an average they will be out of pocket \$20 each, or in the aggregate \$1000. That amount of money could have been kept at home and twice that amount brought in from the surrounding country, had Roseburg's business men seen fit to all "join in" and had a rousing celebration there. As it is, we will have a celebration and a good time any way, on a small scale, and at no expense to the public, while a grand blowout would have cost several hundred dollars and no one in particular, except the business houses, would be greatly benefited. Neither the thousands of dollars spent abroad nor the two or three thousand that might have been spent here, seems to cause Roseburg much concern in these prosperous democratic free trade times, and we mention it only to show what "might have been" were the conditions otherwise.

Our Annual Thirst.

A gentleman familiar with the retail liquor business in this city, estimates that the receipts of the six saloons amount, at least, to \$100 per day, or \$36,500 per annum. To this sum must be added the liquor sold by our three drug stores for medical purposes only, the beer disposed of privately by the brewery, and the prize juice by the distillery. It is a reasonable estimate, therefore, to place the selling price of all the spirituous and malt liquors disposed of in Roseburg annually at \$60,000. Considering the hard times, cavilling outsiders may deem us extravagant. They forget, bless their hearts, that we were born dry and that our city water is bad medicine.

A War Time File.

While tearing away a part of the wall of the old Methodist church house, a carpenter found a small saw-file, within the cavity between the outer and inner skins of the wall, which must have been dropped there by a workman when the building was being erected, 35 years ago. The file is bright and as good as new, and differs from those now made in being about a third shorter and about twice as thick. In comparison with the up-to-date file it looks clumsy.

A BRAVE WOMAN.

In the early part of June Messrs. Woodruff and Whitaker, their wives and three children went to the beach at the mouth of the Umpqua river to spend the day. About noon they started up Winchester bay in a sail-boat, the water being rough made sailing somewhat hazardous. At 11 went well until they reached a point opposite the home of Mrs. Lorham, which was above and out of sight of the life-saving station. The boom of the boat swung suddenly around, striking one of the women on the head. Mrs. Woodruff jumped to catch the boom, capsizing the boat with its seven occupants. The baby remained under the boat, and with great difficulty Mr. Woodruff rescued it from its perilous situation. When the boat capsized, Mrs. Lorham, who is a large muscular woman, ran down to the beach and unaided launched a large schooner-boat, and with strong arms and a brave heart soon had all of the struggling pleasure seekers safe in the boat, and quickly landed on the beach, there Mrs. Lorham resuscitated the baby, which was unconscious, by rolling it on her lap. She then gave dry garments to the party, and put the most exhausted to bed. I see nothing in the county papers of the heroic rescue of these people. A brave act as done by this humane woman should not be allowed to pass without mention. Mrs. Lorham is the wife of Wm. Lorham, a member of the life-saving crew at Winchester bay. She is a native of Carroll county, Minn. Although but 28 years of age, she has to her credit the saving of these persons, all of whom would have drowned were it not for her speedy rescue. She will undoubtedly be the recipient of a medal from the government as soon as it is reported which is to be done by the inspector of life-saving stations. A.
