GOOD ROADS.

Every one who has an occasion to drive out into the country and over country roads admires and enjoys good roads, and never tires of praising them and the people who build and keep them in repair.

Let the state pay a third of the cost. Let the county do the surveying, the making of plans, and the furnishing of tools and machinery, and let the other two-thirds be paid by the road-districts, with money raised by selling bonds, maturing twenty or thirty years hence.

Sewall's Pedigree.
 Bath, Maine, July 11.—For over seventy years has the Sewall private signal, a white "S" on a blue ground fluttered from the main spar of some of the staunchest, finest and swiftest vessels in the merchant marine, carrying the stars and stripes into every foreign port.

Beginning under William D. Sewall, in 1823, the house has been continued and today owns the largest sailing merchant-men afloat under the United States flag. William D. Sewall was succeeded by his sons under the name of F. and H. E. Sewall, which firm became Arthur Sewall & Co., with Hon. Arthur Sewall, the Maine member of the democratic committee and the nominee for vice-president of the United States at its head, and his nephew, Samuel Sewall, and his son, W. D. Sewall, associated with him.
