The weather flags displayed represent the forecast applying to the 24 hours ending at 10 a. m. to-morrow. If more than one kind of weather is predicted for that period, the conditions first named in the forecast will be represented by the uppermost weather flag. A white flag indicates clear or fair weather; a blue flag, rain or snow. The flag of which the upper half is white and the lower half blue, local rain or snow. A black triangular pennant indicates the temperature and when displayed above a weather flag indicates warmer, and when displayed below, cooler. The temperature flag is never displayed alone. Its absence indicates stationary temperature. The cold wave flag, white with black square in the center, when displayed on the Pacific coast, indicates frost.

"When I got off the blind this morning," said a gray haired tramp who asked a job of work to pay for his breakfast (a rare avia), "I thought I was the 'big hobo' aboard; but they crawled out from the brakes and from the roofs until I saw there thirty of 'em. I am not a tramp. I am a workman, I am. Look at my hands, I can do anything. I declare, since I got busted, five months ago, I have become twenty years older. During the long, wet, cold spring, I traveled days and days hunting work, soaked to the skin. If the evening I'd crawl out in the straw of a barn and in the morning came out steaming like a locomotive. It's awful. I have suffered. I traveled through Eastern Oregon, sometimes a hundred miles distant from the railroad, but no work, for the ranchers had no money to pay me. At a place called Mitchell I got a five days job diggin' a well. Often I have worked two or three hours for a bite to eat. I asked a farmer on Butter creek for a job. 'No,' he says, 'I can't hire ye, but it will be some dinner time, an' if you'll codd some of that hay I'll give ye something to eat.' I worked for an hour and a half, and then filled my belly with bread an' milk an' a piece of bacon. I'm an old soldier, an' might strike the Soldiers' Home for a living, but prefer beatin' my way to California to work in harvest."
