A New Way to Kill Scale. Fred Ahlborn and Clark Hendricks of Orange, Cal,, have discovered and are now successfully experimenting with a new scale destroyer. A tent is placed over the tree and inflated with gasoline gas, a torch applied and in the explosion which follows the scale are killed. If the operation is successfully done the leaves may be slightly singed, but the fruit remains uninjured. The plant life in the tree being of superior vitality to the animal life in the scale, an amount of gas sufficient to destroy the one and not injure the fruit of the other is required. It is to ascertain this amount and how to apply the findings to the ever-changing conditions to be met in practical use that experiments are now directed.
