A Free Silver Speech.

Albert Abraham, the young Portland attorney, tackled the silver question at the fair grounds Friday afternoon, and wrestled with it for about an hour before a fair sized audience. While not so fluent a talker as Boy Orator Bryan is reported to be, Mr. Abraham's arguments were fully as good as any of these we have read promulgated by the democratic presidential candidate from the rear end of a Pullman car, while "swinging round the circle." While some of his premises may have been correct, the conclusion he arrived at was almost invariably wrong. For instance, he said: "Immediately after the election in 1892 of a free trade president and a free trade congress, the mere fact of such election, even before any tariff legislation could be enacted, produced such a depression in business and brought on such hard times that many heretofore free trade congressmen, became alarmed and instead of enacting free trade laws compromised by passing the Wilson bill." So far, so good, but when he concludes that "the Wilson bill is no more a free trade law than the McKinley bill," the Oregon wool growers will not take much stock in the gentleman's conclusions.

Peter F. Stenger Dead.

BURNS, Or, Aug. 28.—Peter F. Stenger, well and favorably known in this state, and particularly in Eastern Oregon, died yesterday evening, after a brief illness, of blood poisoning. August 20, Mr. Stenger was butchering a beef, and by accident cut his finger with the knife he was using. Mr. Stenger had been a resident of what is now Harney county since 1874, and was always identified with the interests of this country, as a merchant and as a prominent stock man. He left two grown daughters and three small children, one girl and two boys, of tender years. He was a robust man, in the prime of life, about 44 years of age. He was buried by the L. O. O. F. lodge at his place, of which he was a prominent member.

His parents, Leonard and Elizabeth Stenger, emigrated from Peoria, Ill., in 1852, and began a pioneer life in the dense forest just west of the present city of Portland, where the deceased was born, subsequently removing and making a permanent settlement at Canyonville, (Douglas county), where young Stenger grew to manhood. In 1874 he established himself as a rancher and stockraiser in the Harney valley country, and amassed a large fortune. In 1884, with George McGowan, he founded the town of Burns.

Egyptian Darkness.
