**GARDINER.**  
On the Umpqua River. One of the Loveliest Milling Towns in the Union.  
Nine miles from the ocean and on the Umpqua river, is the bright and beautiful town, Gardiner. Rounding a bend, the handsome steamer, Eva, gives its passengers one of the grandest scenes in this glorious land of mountain, valley and flood.  
The river, two miles broad, is alive with row boats and sailing craft, and a dainty little steamer is puffing its way to the creamery, loaded with milk cans shining in the sun.  
The town is radiant with its lovely houses rising terrace upon terrace and vieing with each other in white and cream, and slate and lavender. Red roofs here and there, make the lawns, gardens and orchards a brighter green, and the big mill at one end of the town, and commodious halls with flag stairs, look as the parents of the family. Across the river the salmon cannery answers whistle for whistle, and the creamery on the Gardiner side keeps teams rattling along the road. From the creamery extends the home ranch of State Senator A. W. Reed. It has great level fields on which browse 200 milk givers, and has 300 acres in cultivation.  
On each side of the Umpqua, great mountains rise, and trees in autumn coloring.  
Gardiner is built on the donation claim of Ex-Governor Gibbs and the Hon. A. W. Reed holds the patents. When Reed came here twenty-eight years ago, from Maine, there was a mill, three dwellings and a store. He went to work in the mill and has risen from the saw mill to the senate. He was foreman of the mill fourteen years, then took to steamboating and is still interested in the river steamers. He is the manager and owner of the cannery, known as that of the Gardiner Packing Co., the output reaching 15,000 cases of salmon a season. But one was resumed two weeks ago and is now in full swing with every likelihood of a prosperous year for the "Map Brand." There is no better equipped butter and cheese factory in the state than that of Mr. Reed at Gardiner. The building two stories high, is as white as purity, and internally is admirably arranged, while externally it can receive from land and river. The machinery includes a twenty-five horse power engine, receiving land cream vats, the unsurpassed Alpha No. 1 separator, butterworker and cutter, and all the auxiliaries for first class production of butter and cheese. This season the creamery received as high as 6500 pounds of milk in a day, and has been in successful operation since April last. More important than the machinery, however, is the fact that the manager and maker is one of the most experienced men east or west. Reference is made to W. J. Perkins, who was born in Herkimer county, and raised in O'Neida county, New York, and they are celebrated as the great Eastern centers of butter and cheese manufacture.  
Mr. Perkins has been in the business for a quarter of a century, and has gained a national reputation and has been manager of five first class factories. His manufacture is worthy of premium honors and commands the top of the market.  
Mr. Reed also owns town site and 1200 acres and a big mercantile house, a beautiful home and the good word of everybody on land or water. His chief aide de camp and accountant, Frank Rogers, has lots to do but is equal to every task, and Mr. Reed has been quite happy in his choice of lieutenant.  
The Gardiner Mill Co. is a famous corporation, and their mill after important improvements is now sounding the soprano of the saw and the baritone of the planer. It has two engines, 600 and 400 horse power, respectively, propelling double circulars and gang saws, gang edges and pony circular, granting a capacity of 80,000 feet of fir and spruce in ten hours. The planing mill does its duty to 30,000 feet of lumber at the same time, and the output of lath is 20,000 feet. The mill is as trim as a man of war and there are no ghastly heaps of slabs around. The dock, 500 feet in length, cost several thousand dollars, and there is a mile of boom capable of holding eight million feet of logs.  
The superintendent, W. F. Jewett, has been at Gardiner for seventeen years, and is a State of Maine. His men say there is no more popular or capable mill man on the coast or anywhere else. The statement is borne out by one flier with him ten years, planer man, nine years; sawyer, seven years; gang saw, seven years; log hauler, seven years and fireman, five years.  
The accountant, O. B. Hinsdale, has been with the company seven years and formerly with the Puget Sound Mill Company. He has vessel interests, bank stock and real estate made by energy and good judgment.  
W. F. Jewett is president at the Umpqua River Steam Navigation Company, with the Eva sailing daily to and from the ocean and Scottsburg, and the Juno also daily from and to Gardiner and Sulphur Springs up Smith river, and he has interests too numerous to mention. The Jewett mansion at Gardiner is a dream of cream colored beauty, with emerald lawn and many beauties of the floral

kingdom, and attracts and holds every eye.  
The mill manager, P. A. Brownell, possesses thirty-two years experience and he is a stirring citizen. He owns a beautiful home which cost him \$3,000, and that of A. E. Anderson, \$1500. Fly and Anderson are stevedores. Captain Cornwall, captain of the Eva; and general manager of the Cornwall Stage & Navigation Co., has a lovely \$2000 residence.  
The Masonic Hall, cost \$2000 and the I. O. O. F. Hall being built will cost a like amount.  
The Baptist church, (union services) cost \$1500. The Gardiner Hotel, \$3500, and the schoolhouse—well, the sooner they get a building worthy of the place the better.  
The Gardiner Mill Co., own an avenue of beautiful cottages and no two buildings alike, and strips of green down the roadway. Their big mercantile house carries up to \$30,000 worth of goods and they supply all around directly and indirectly about 400 men.  
Gardiner has numerous lodges, the most prominent being the A. F. & A. M., I. O. O. F., A. O. U. W., Maccabees, and Foresters of America.  
This is a very beautiful and very healthy country, but men will get hurt on the mountains, in the mills or on the river, so Gardiner has a first class physician and surgeon in Dr. J. L. Elwood. His father being a pharmacist he began his drug experience at eleven years of age. He is a member of a great pharmaceutical family, as not only his father but his brother, three uncles and half a dozen cousins are pharmacists. But Dr. Elwood went further and graduated as a physician and surgeon and is held in high regard professionally and socially. With his office he has a complete establishment devoted to materia medica.  
The Gardiner post office, although isolated from railway and stage road, receives by steamer, which connects with stage lines, one daily mail, two semi and two tri-weekly mails.  
The postmaster is a veteran, for this country, as in that officiate he has granted unqualified satisfaction to government and the people for about eighteen years. Reference is made to J. H. Butler, who is also a pioneer who has had a remarkably interesting career. He was born in Massachusetts and came to Oregon in 1861, locating at Scottsburg. He worked with his father, then took to the river, steamboating, succeeding which mining attracted him to Idaho, where he also engaged in packing and saddle trains, then when the war news came, he joined the gallant Oregon Cavalry. After the cessation of hostilities he showed mechanical genius and came to Gardiner in 1878. He has since been not only postmaster, but deputy collector United States customs, and in lesser positions showed public spirit. He has also been landlord and owns a hotel building which he rents, and he has a snug residence, and the post office building, which is detached from other structures. J. H. Butler is a business man of principle and ability, and a gentleman held in the highest regard by young and old, rich and poor.  
The Pacific Hotel is rented by J. G. Daley who lately bought the big Gardiner House, and he runs the two, the smaller house being used for apartments. Mr. Daley came here four years ago and he didn't have enough "to set him up." He now owns the hotel and all that is in it, and a ranch of 160 acres, and can pay in a minute all he may owe. He is an Austrian, and a capable ad., as he is 250 pounds avoirdupois but active all over.  
Gardiner is busy and deserves to be, because all the people pull together and there is no snarling as everybody has a good word for everybody and Gardiner in particular. JAMES GAINSWELL.

**THE QUESTION SOLVED.**  
EDITOR PLAINDEALER: I am not a scholar, much less a political student, but by your leave I will correct some of the errors which have, either inadvertently or otherwise, crept into your contention for a gold standard.  
The Bryan programme is as follows, as near as the writer can explain it: First open the mints to silver coinage at 42 1/2 grains to the dollar. This coin to be the standard and measure of everything. We claim that the opening of the mints to silver will raise the price of silver bullion by creating a demand for silver. It will decrease the demand for gold, thus decrease the value of gold bullion; and bringing the two metals nearer together. Then if gold refuses to circulate, and we think it necessary, take a little gold out of the gold dollar and put a little more silver into the silver dollar and thus the question will be solved.
