

THE GOLD MINES.

The Bohemia, Noonday, Champion, Music and the Golden Star, Mines Being Rapidly Developed.

Forty-seven and a half miles is the measured distance from Oakland to the Bohemia group of gold mines. The road is being rapidly but carefully made. The workers are within nine miles of the mines, having made about thirty-eight miles of way admirably graded, with sound bed, and ample breadth. C. L. Chenoweth of Oakland and another gentleman made an inspectory trip the other day, and were astonished at the easy going, and believe it will become one of the best mountain roads in the state.

The Noonday Gold Mining Company expended \$8,000 on a road to get their machinery in; it was hauled from Cottage Grove. Their road was started on the 15th of May, being a continuation of an old road which reached to within ten miles of the mines. The Noonday road runs to the summit and connects with the Oakland survey, and if the Douglas county people rush things, Mr. Jennings, the superintendent, says he will require twenty-five teams before bad weather, and he will ship via Oakland. He will be ready to ship concentrates this fall, getting out ten tons a day. The Noonday mine has rich sulphate ore which go \$150 to the ton, and they will be shipped to the Tacoma smelters.

In January, '96, the Noonday Company started a crosscut tunnel of 500 feet and tapped a vein 400 feet and got a ledge of ore several feet wide, and it is fair grade. They are now driving west and cross-cutting to both walls from center. On main drive base ore shows from \$25 to \$100 a ton. The Noonday, formerly the Annie, has a twenty stamp mill. The engine and the boilers are in place, and the frame at the mill is up and being shingled. The mill will be completed by the 15th and in operation on the 20th of October. They are also building a tramway from the mine to the mill, a distance of 3,000 feet, and are progressing rapidly so as to have everything in readiness for the grand start. The officers at the Noonday Gold Mining Company are: President, E. B. Lee; Vice President, Henry D. Laughlin; Secretary, George E. Willigan; Treasurer, George I. Atkins, all of Chicago. The superintendent, P. J. Jennings, has been mining since 1876 in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, British Columbia, Washington and now Oregon. He has, as superintendent, employed hundreds of men at a time, and has now 117 on the pay roll, and about that number will hereafter be steadily employed. His office is at Cottage Grove. The assayer and accountant, H. Lee, has just arrived. He was brought with the United States assay ship to St. Louis.

Three-quarters of a mile from the Noonday is the Champion mine owned by Michigan men. They have a stamp mill, made by I. E. Hammond of Portland, and he built the twenty stamp mill for the Noonday Company. The Champion is turning out from three to twenty tons a day and the ore runs \$10 to the ton.

The Music mine, owned by the Bohemia Milling and Mining Company, a California syndicate, is a great mine and well developed 500 feet deep. It has from sixteen to twenty feet of ore, going all the way from \$25 to \$100 to the ton. They have a five-stamp mill running one mile from the Champion.

Half a mile from the Bohemia or Music mine, Los Angeles capitalists developed quite a mine last year. They are now organizing a company and will put up a fine stamp mill.

Three miles south from the Bohemia and directly on the Oakland road, P. J. Jennings owns individually the Golden Star mine. There he has a five stamp mill, Chicago make. He intended to run it by water but it didn't pan out as he expected, so he is putting in an engine and will have the Golden Star shining by the first of December. He has a vein two feet thick and continuous in length, as shown in his having opened 3,000 feet, and it is very rich in free gold. A number of smaller properties are being developed. Cottage Grove is building another road and Albert W. Carey of Cottage Grove has platted a little town four miles from the mines, on the main highway and Carey's creek. The plat covers fifteen acres and the name of the future great is Hardscrabble.
