A democratic contemporary declares "the Bryan republicans of Alameda county are to be organized in a club by themselves."

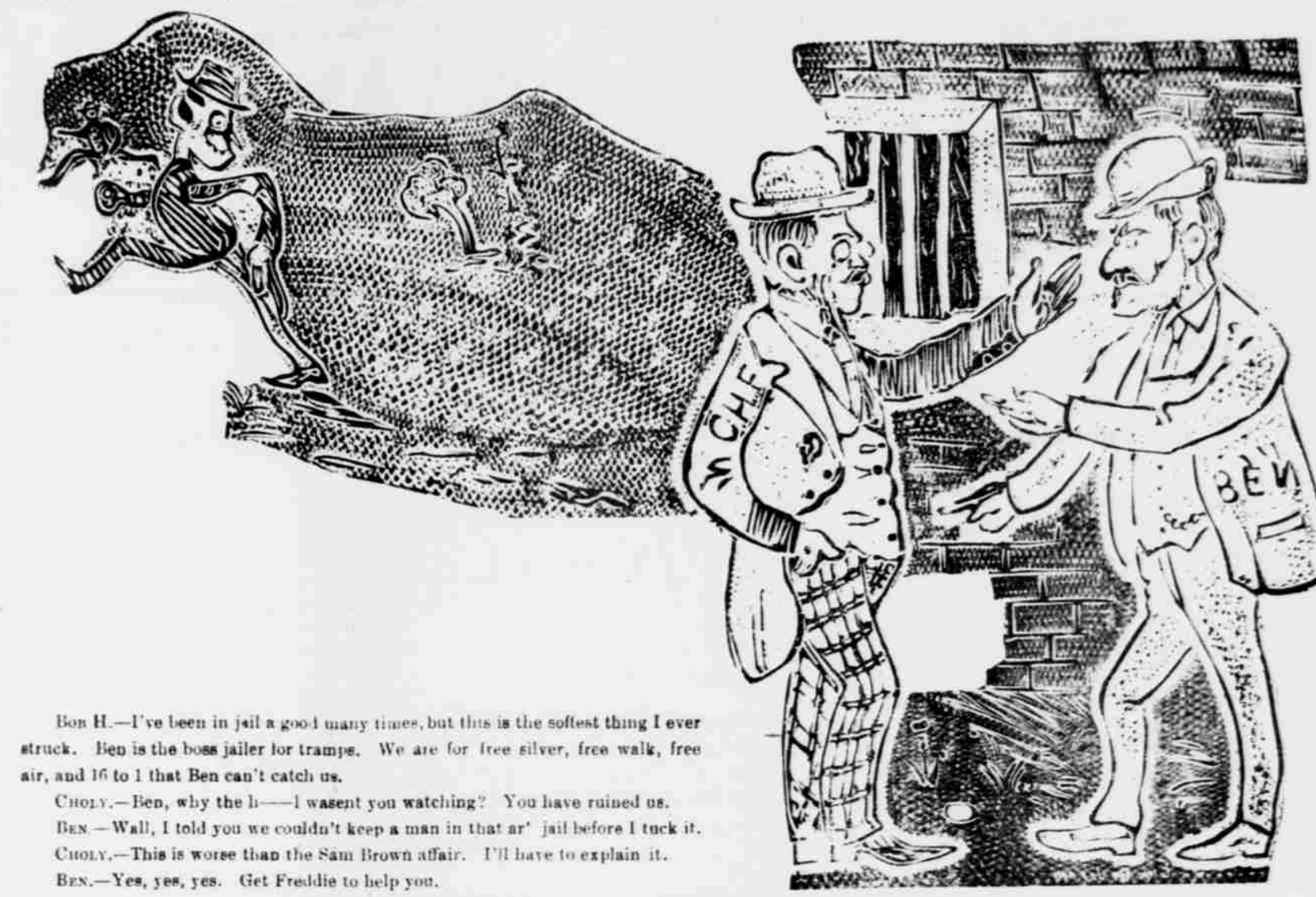
The last report we had from the McKinley Club the number had increased to 117.
