DEATH OF C. H. LEWIS.

Pioneer Business Man Succumbs to Paralysis.

C. H. Lewis, the best-known of Portland's merchants, passed peacefully away at 2:47 this morning, after an illness of two days, from paralysis. He was surrounded by his family at his death, but was unconscious to the last.

Mr. Lewis was stricken with paralysis Saturday afternoon while on his way to business. He was immediately taken to his home and given all the assistance that medical skill could provide, but gradually sank and lingered until his death. His wonderful vitality was all that held death at bay so long. The paralysis at first extended only over one side, and Dr. Holt C. Wilson, his nephew and physician, hoped that the stroke might be only temporary. But paralysis at Mr. Lewis' advanced years almost invariably proves fatal, and the case of Portland's greatest merchant proved no exception to the rule.

As he lay at his home gradually sinking he was surrounded by his family, and his many friends called at the house almost hourly to learn of his condition. Dr. Wilson was continually at his bedside, ministering to his every need, but his skill was unavailing, and Mr. Lewis finally passed peacefully away, unconscious almost from the first.

His son John, who had been summoned from Southern Oregon, was at his bedside when he expired, and Mrs. Bingham is expected today.

On the streets yesterday any news of his condition was eagerly awaited, and the breathless interest with which any rumor was listened to told of the warm place he had in the hearts of every one who knew him. In every office and store his illness was the subject of general conversation, and the hopelessness of his condition the subject of general regret.

His loss will be deeply felt by hundreds of business acquaintances and friends, and the death of no member of the community could have caused more sorrow. His business connections extended over the entire Pacific coast, and in no city, town or village of Oregon will his loss be unnoted. Unfading in integrity, firm in purpose, large of heart, and perfect in every quality that goes to make a man, he was a man whose worth has always been appreciated, and, taking him for all in all, Portland will never look upon his like again.—Oregonian, Jan. 5.
