Douglas County Gold Fields.

The gold placer grounds of Douglas are turning out thousands of dollars every year, and new fields are being developed. The latest is the Ollaia placers. Dr. J. G. Day, Jr. and H. R. Littlefield of the Paradise Alloy Mining Co., are now engaged in constructing a large ditch to bring water onto the grounds which prospect well. They have a large force at work on their ditch. This will doubtless increase the output of gold in Douglas and add much to the mineral wealth of the county. The placers on Cox Creek, Tennessee Gulch, Starveout, Hogem Gulch, Myrtle and Coffee creek, have been worked for the last 10 years with success, having yielded richly to the hardy miners who have worked them; and with flattering prospects of good pay for half a century more. Besides the placer mines named in southern Douglas there are rich quartz mines in the northeastern part of the county—the Bohemia mines—which are now attracting much attention on account of their richness and exhaustless extent. Also the Black Republican Quartz mine on the tributaries of Myrtle Creek bids fair to prove a bonanza to its owners who are expending much money developing it. The mining interests of Douglas will no doubt prove a source of wealth to this county far more than has heretofore been dreamed of.

Leg Broken by a Fall.

Last Friday about 4 p. m., as Mr. S. W. VanZile, who resides on Mill street near the power house, was engaged in painting the roof of his house, the roof ladder which supported him while at work, gave way, precipitating him to the sidewalk, a distance of about twenty six feet. Mr. VanZile struck first upon the walk with such force as to break the right leg a few inches above the ankle, the fractured bone protruding through the flesh and severely shaking him up by the concussion. So that, aside from the broken leg, he is quite sore and physically demoralized.

Good Roads.

Good roads are what every traveler admires, whether millionaire or pauper. And, notwithstanding this great desire for and appreciation of good roads, they are luxuries but few enjoy, because the poor cannot make them and the rich will not make them when they cannot exclusively enjoy them, and consequently, good roads are like angels visit—few and far between.

The only system of road building that will, as experience has proven, construct and maintain good roads is that of levying a road tax to be paid in money to be expended for the construction and repair of roads by a contract system, under the supervision of the county authorities which shall let contracts to the lowest bidder for specified work, like that of building bridges or court houses or any other public works. When this state will put in vogue such a system of road making it may hope to succeed.

The Latest Swindle.

A new swindle reported by some of our exchanges is worked by two men. One buys an article in a store and pays for it with a marked bill. Board of Equalization.

The state board of equalization has raised the assessment of 22 counties. Douglas county from \$5,147,500 to \$5,277,204, or \$129,704, seven counties were lowered, viz: Clatsop, Coos, Grant, Klamath, Union, Wallowa and Washington. The assessments in three counties were left as returned by the assessors, viz: Columbia, Curry and Lake. The total taxable property in the state after the deductions is \$143,176,071.
