A meeting of the citizens of Myrtle Creek and vicinity was held in the school house on Saturday afternoon, March 6, 1897, for the purpose of organizing a Sugar Beet Growers society. Robert Eccleston being chosen president and Sam Moore appointed secretary.

The meeting was very ably addressed by Messrs. Henry Trower, W. B. Drake, E. J. Chaney, Robert Eccleston and others. On motion of Mr. Chaney, the chairman appointed a committee consisting of Ed Weaver, John Hall, Wm Mulkey, Ike Weaver, W. N. Moore, Mike Dean and Frank Gasley, to ascertain how many acres of land would be pledged to a company that would erect a plant at Myrtle Creek for the purpose of manufacturing sugar. Adjourned to meet the first Saturday in April, at which time the committee is expected to report.

County Court Proceedings.

The county court convened at the court house on Wednesday last and continued in session on Saturday. Present County Judge Stearns, Commissioners Thompson and Wilson. The following proceedings were had:

March 3. Mr. Laird appeared on behalf of the old Coos Bay wagon road and asked an appropriation of \$100 to repair the same.

John Aiken and F. A. McCall asked the court to purchase the fair grounds. There are some obligations against the property and the county was asked to take these up and receive the title, use the place for a poor farm and allow the society to use it as a fair ground also.

March 4. Bond for proposed road from Oakland to Rice settlement approved also bond approved for road from Glendale to Wild Cat.

In the matter of proposed road from W. L. Wilson's to Deane's, the report of the viewers and surveyors was read first time.

Application for Wm. Clifton for assistance made by Darwin Patterson. Allowed \$5 per month from January 1.

Bond for proposed road from Roseburg to Looking Glass, approved, petition received. John Hardin, A. W. Stanton, M. L. Bushnell appointed viewers to meet at Roseburg Tuesday March 10, 1897, at 10 a. m.

In the matter of the Glendale and Wild Cat road, John Shultz, Frank Shultz and Frank Eckland appointed viewers and J. T. Henderson surveyor.

Road of public easement for Wm. Fisher. Discontinued.

In the matter of appointing a justice of the peace at Oakland, to fill the unexpired term of W. T. Turner resigned, E. Malby was appointed.

Bond of Geo. Carv, \$500, to complete present ownership books, T. R. Sheridan and John East settlers, approved.

Bond of W. A. Frater, commander of Rose High, disbursing of insolvent lands, approved.

March 5. Hardin Davis, John Hagan and J. L. Hunt appointed viewers of the Oakland and Rice Settlement road, and W. P. Hayden, surveyor, to meet at Oakland Saturday March 27.

Report of viewers and surveyor of Wilson and Dean road, read 2d time, ordered filed, and road opened.

Error in boundary of road districts 21 and 22 corrected to read 3 1/2 miles instead of one mile.

The following correction was made in line between districts 63, 51 and 40: Beginning at SE corner Sec. 13 and 29 and west 4 1/2 miles, south 1/4 mile, west 1/2 mile, south 1/4 mile, east 1/2 mile, north 1/4 mile, east 1/2 mile, north 1/4 mile and north 6 miles to place of beginning.

W. Redfield appointed to fill vacancy caused by death of L. Jones, supervisor of road district No. 46.

James Conn appointed supervisor of road district No. 27, vice Geo. Scott resigned.

The tax apportionment of five mills for school purposes, was read. The amount should be 1 mill and the correction is made accordingly.

March 6. Plaindealer and Review asked to bid on delinquent tax sales, and to send in bids by 1 p. m.

In the matter of the Hall and Underwood road, J. W. Hamilton appeared on behalf of the Hall estate asking county to consider the question of paying more damages. The previous amount was \$140.

In the case of W. W. Cardwell vs. E. C. Agne, sheriff to obtain possession of money found on James Nelson, the clerk's fee of \$5 was remitted.

In the matter of bids for the printing of delinquent taxes, the Review Pub. Co. would not put in a bid. The bid of Plaindealer was 20 cents per line. Sheriff is ordered and now notified not to
