NEWS NOTES.

General Draper is likely to succeed General Lee as consul to Havana. The "talent" in San Francisco fell hard in the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight.

Peter Dalidet of San Luis Obispo, Cal., was fatally shot by a younger brother Friday. The floods in the Mississippi promise to be the largest and most destructive of life and property in years.

Deari Bryan's murderers, Jackson and Walling, were hung in Kentucky, Friday. Jackson broke down and confessed. Preparations are being made to drive cattle from Seattle overland to the Yukon where there is a scarcity of fresh meat.

Rev. Robt. McLean has discovered that the people of Grants Pass expend more money for tobacco than they do for bread. At the inauguration of a republican club at Madrid, Spain, revolutionary speeches led to a riot in which several persons were injured.

Chicago is to do honor to itself by erecting a statue on the lake front of the city, to that gallant and famous Illinois soldier, Gen. John A. Logan. Corbett admits that he was fairly and squarely whipped by Fitzsimmons, whom he now calls a wonderful pugilist, but wants another chance at him.

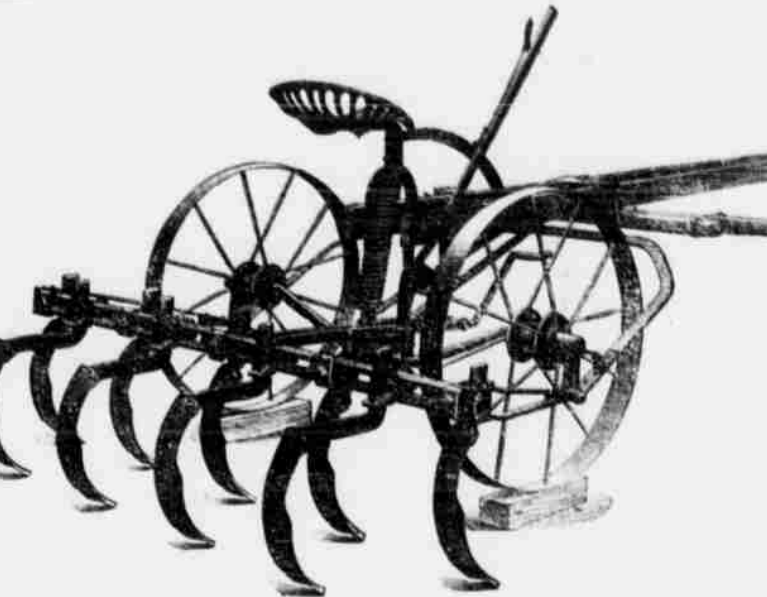
Charles, the 15-year-old son of J. N. Miller, while trying to catch a ride on the incoming freight train at Oregon City, Thursday evening, near the Elevator street crossing, fell from the car, and his left leg was crushed at the knee and below. Charlie Winter and Willie Babbitt, two boys living near Linton, Indiana, played William Tell and in lieu of an apple Babbitt placed a corn-cob on his head. Winter, using a revolver, shot at the corn-cob and the ball struck Babbitt in the forehead, killing him instantly.

It is reported that four Rogue river trappers are aiming to go into the trapping business on an extensive scale next winter and employ twenty men, 500 traps and three experienced trappers. The Umpqua mountains are to be the scene of the work if it is carried out. The election in Central Point resulted in the selection of the following officers: Trustees, S. W. McClendon, J. W. Olwell, J. H. Gay, John Clements, J. W. Merritt, recorder; J. W. Jacobs, treasurer; C. A. Mason, marshal; Daniel Lyness, street commissioner; Lee Ingram.

Some intelligent work in behalf of forestry at the legislature of the Ohio was done in order among the state legislatures interested. There have been three great floods in the river during the last seventeen years, and there were only two during the preceding eighty years. The republicans of Dallas, Polk county, have put the following ticket in the field: Mayor, Dr. L. N. Woods; recorder, C. W. Smith; marshal, T. B. Rowell; councilmen, J. C. Uglow, Ed. Biddle, F. J. Chapman. The new ward committee men are Wilson Webb, J. C. Hayter and Nat Holman.

William Adkins, whose wife committed suicide in Cottage Grove not long ago, was in Eugene the other day, and informed the marshal that certain persons are after him to hang him to a tree. Adkins' mind is unbalanced and a complaint has been sworn out for his commitment to the asylum. Miss Emma Barden, a teacher in the sixth grade of the public schools of Albany, was placed in charge of a one day party, alleged to have been committed by severely whipping Miss Neva Trainor, a pupil, aged 15. The complaint is made by Miss Trainor's mother. At a special meeting the stockholders of the First National bank of Hillsboro voted Thursday to go into voluntary liquidation May 1. Of the \$30,000 capital stock, \$30,000 was represented at the meeting, and voted unanimously for liquidation. A private bank will in the meantime be organized, and will continue in business. Last week they had another rabbit drive over near Pineville. Men, women and children gathered with lunch baskets and by noon had driven into a corral and slain abt 500 rabbits. Then they spread out the contents of their baskets and ate and laughed as one another told of the humorous incidents of the drive. TO THE PUBLIC.

I and my deputies will take the time to make the assessment for the year 1897 about March 15th. We will have field books showing each persons assessment and the description of their land as it now stands on the assessment roll for the year 1897. The land of this county has been checked off on township ranges or sections, so that in some cases you are paying taxes on some other person's land, leaving the taxes on your own unpaid and the land liable to be sold for taxes. In other cases the description is so indefinite that it is impossible to know what land is meant. In the checking off the plats of the county there appears to be a considerable portion of the land that is not assessed to any body. This is also the case in checking off lots and blocks in town property. In other cases I find two individuals both paying taxes on the same property. The law requires that all property laid off in lots and blocks be assessed by lot and block unless the same is cancelled on the records of the county. The law requires each person to make a list of the property owned by him on the first day of March subject to taxation including a description of all real estate, and I ask that each of you prepare such a list and an accurate description of your land so that when I or my deputies call on you may be prepared to give in your property and know it is correct. I would suggest that you prepare such a list and leave it with some member of your family in case you are going away from home, so that myself or deputies can have it to use in case we call while you are away. Remember that if we cannot get it from you, we will have to list your property from the best information we can get, and should we fail to get all of your property and in checking it off on our plat find it was not assessed, and have to assess it to "Unknown Owner," it might cause you much expense and trouble. Myself and deputies will endeavor to make the cost of assessment as low as possible by cleaning up the work as we pass through the territory. In conclusion I would say that the only safe way to keep your property from being sold for taxes, is for each one to be sure that all of his property is properly described and assessed and that his tax receipt shows that he has paid the same. A tax receipt is good only on property that has been assessed. W. S. BERRY, Assessor.
