A Man's Myriad Ancestors.

Grandfathers and grandmothers are very proud when they can boast of having a noble name or two of distinction, but no one seems to be aware of the grounds he has for boasting of the number of his ancestors. Has it ever occurred to you to count back in a direct line, asks a writer in London Answers? If not, try it now and you will be astonished. At the first remove you have two—father and mother. At the next step you have four—two grandfathers and two grandmothers.

Each of these has had a father and a mother, so you have four great-grandfathers and four great-grandmothers. Each of these again has had two parents so that at the fourth generation back you have 16 ancestors, at the fifth you have 32, at the sixth you have 64, and at the seventh you have 128.

As you go a little further, they rise to the thousands, tens of thousands and hundreds of thousands, so that if all your direct ancestors for 20 generations be added together they amount to over a million, and if you go back another 20 degrees they total 1,000,000,000,000—or more people than there are in the world at the present moment, if you leave out Asia. Now, as 10 generations are equal to only about 1200 years, if you were to calculate back to the beginning of the world you simply couldn't find figures to express the number of your blood relations.

Volcanic Energy.

Simply reading about volcanoes gives no clear impression of the tremendous energy shown by these strange freaks of nature. The roar of Cotopaxi was heard of Krakatoa, so recent as 1883, was heard in Australia, a distance of 1900 miles, the longest distance on record of the extending of sound vibrations. During the eruption of Etna, in 1700, rocks weighing 500 pounds were thrown to Pompeii, a distance of six miles. Cotopaxi has also been known to hurl a rock containing 100 cubic yards a distance of nine miles. It is estimated that this tremendous missile must have been thrown originally 15 miles into the air. The discharge from Tunguragua, a peak of the Andes, in 197, made a deposit 600 feet deep and 20 miles long, in a valley 1000 feet wide. The discharge of sand, ashes and scoriae from Mount Etna, in 1767, formed Mount Rosini, a structure two miles in circumference and 4000 feet high. In fact, during the eruption, Etna disgorged more than 20 times its own mass. In 79, during the eruption of Vesuvius, which destroyed Pompeii and Herculaneum, the volcano vomited an amount of matter far exceeding the bulk of the whole mountain itself.

Mrs. Dr. C. E. Bogue is down with a case of the measles and Edith Nichols, little daughter of H. H. Nichols, is also ill with that measles disease.

At the 4th of July meeting held at Canyonville last Wednesday evening it was decided to celebrate the 4th there and A. Wollenberg was elected as president and J. B. Ford, secretary.

Mr. Joshua Fawcett who mines on North Myrtle had the misfortune of having his cabin robbed of all its contents one day last week. It seems like there are a few thieves at large yet.

Work will be commenced on Riddle & Frater's mining ditch at the Cracker Jack mine next Monday by a force of eight men. The ditch is to be about four miles long and will enable the owners to operate the mine about five months in the year with a giant.

Mrs. Julia Zazinski, who has been living at St. Joseph's hospital, in Tacoma, is dying. She turned her 100th year in February, and until her present illness was in full possession of all her faculties, and could speak a fine needle with- out stopping. She was living with her parents in Belgium when the battle of Waterloo was fought, and from a distance saw Blucher charge madly forward with his belated troops and engage the French. She could speak German, Polish, Dutch, French and English, but occasionally, when in a hurry, ran them in together in one comical medley. She has been a privileged character among the sisters at the hospital for a number of years doing general housework.

The Cuban dollar will be on the street within a few days. It will be a silver coin of the size of the Spanish coin known as five pesetas. Five million dollars' worth of bullion is to be converted into the coin, which, even if it is no more than a souvenir of the Cuban struggle, will still be worth its weight.

The Cuban junta indorses the circulation of silver coin bearing the stamp of the provisional government. The money to buy this bullion and to defray the mechanical expense of the issue is said to have been raised through the exertion of A. J. Corbett, a local broker. He professes ignorance as to the identity of his principals.

Fox Island, Wash., was a great place for "carmin't" last year, and the island was raided by the inhabitants who killed about a thousand, among which were cougar, wild cat, coon, bear, mink and weasel. Last week there was another great hunt in which several hundred hunters participated, but the sum total of the catch was about half a dozen blue jays and a couple of crows.

This season this valley will produce the greatest crop of pears and apples in its history. The farmers report the fall-sown wheat in a flourishing condition, and on account of the excessive moisture during the winter, unless the hot winds of June blast their hopes, they will reap the greatest harvest known in the history of the valley.—Walla Walla Union.

The Oregon Women's Flax Fiber Association of Portland received last week their first foreign order—for 1000 pounds of fiber for use by a manufacturer in Germany.
