WAS IT SECONDARY.

Democratic orators and papers under the leadership of Mr. Cleveland himself are attacking the administration because it is not devoting itself to currency reform instead of formulating a highly protective tariff measure, contending that the battle of last November was fought and won on the currency issue. This is true. But the question was not so much one of reforming or changing the currency laws as that they should not be changed by the adoption of a 16 to 1 free coinage law. On the one hand the fusionists had their slogan the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, independent of any other nation on earth. Men with some knowledge of the laws of commerce and of value knew the adoption of such a policy meant ruin and disaster and flocked to the standard of the republicans, not so much for a change in the currency law as for their preservation. Under their operation all the money of the country was kept on a par and that was the one thing needed. In the discussions of the campaign this was the foremost issue and the tariff was made secondary for the time being. But as soon as the election was over and it was determined that no change of standards was to be made then, as a matter of course, the tariff law should receive first and immediate attention, if for no other reason, that the revenues might be made equal at least to the expenditures.

Then again, the defeat of the republicans in 1892 is attributed to the McKinley law passed in 1890. Demagogues succeeded in persuading hundreds of thousands of working men that their employers were too prosperous, that they themselves were not receiving their proper share of the wealth they created; in short that the McKinley law was in the interest of the rich and the oppressor of the poor, notwithstanding the fact that we as a nation were enjoying unprecedented prosperity. Then, for the first time in 30 years, the democrats obtained control of all the branches of the government and as a result gave us the Wilson-Gorman bill, a mongrel monstrosity, the issue of a compact between ignorance and cunning. We are living under the operation of that law yet. Its baleful influences were so soon felt that at the first election after its enactment the country spoke in no uncertain tones and a republican house was elected. The tide had set the other way and the leaders of democracy were aghast. They saw that the people would demand a return to the protective policy and to call off the public attention the currency issue was raised and forced to the front, as the cause of the trouble. The repeal of the Sherman law revealed the fact that relief did not lie in the direction of currency legislation, but the issue was forced just the same. But every school boy knew that republican success meant above everything else the protection of American labor and American products, and as soon as the administration was fairly installed it set about important work. The president and the house have done their duty; but in the senate, where the republicans have not a working majority, the measure is hung up by the obstructionists and the country is suffering. The people voted for protection, they expect it, they want it, they ought to have it.

A confederate monument was recently unveiled at Dallas, Texas, with imposing ceremonies, and the leaders of the confederacy eulogized, and their work lauded to the skies. If this is to be one country under one flag, ought we not to refrain from building monuments to the men who tried to destroy it? If the confederate cause was deserving of eulogy then it was right, and Lincoln, and Grant, and Seward, and Sherman, and the loyal hosts were wrong in destroying it. Love of country—one united country—is not aided by object lessons held up to the view of the descendants of Southern leaders teaching that their sires were defeated in a righteous cause. We may admire the courage of the Southern soldier. We should, for it was deserving of all admiration. But for the men who deliberately planned the overthrow of the government, and to set up another government and to create a new nation, within the territory of the United States there should be no monuments. If their acts were treason then, 'tis treason now. Let the dead past bury its dead.

Senator Jones, of Nevada, who holds the balance of power, has joined with the democrats of the finance committee in objecting to reporting the tariff bill direct to the senate as framed by the republican members. This move is a disappointment to the republican senators in congress and to the administration. The bill will have to be reported to the full committee, and the democratic members of the committee say that, while they do not intend to obstruct the measure, they propose to take time for its careful consideration before permitting it to come before the senate. The democrats refuse to let the republicans name a day for the report, and say it may be held in committee for two or three weeks. The chances for early passage of the bill are diminishing, and it may be August before it goes to the president.

There seems to be a difference of opinion among the democratic brethren concerning the populist determination to "keep in the middle of the road." Some of them, especially those of the spoils variety, deprecate the action of the populists, but democrats of the old school are inclined to say, let them go it. They know that in the next campaign the populists will be handicapped with apologies for the part their representatives took in the late legislative fiasco. Their guns are spiked.

The sympathies of the civilized world are with the Greeks in their struggles with the forces of the sultan, and while the prospect of ultimate Grecian success is not bright it is still hoped the fortunes of war may turn in her favor. A little success may encourage neighboring nations now groaning under the Turkish yoke to make common cause with the Greeks and by uniting their forces overcome the representative of the prophet and drive the Mussulman out of Europe.

The efforts of the personal friends of Mr. Cleveland to put him forward again as a candidate for the presidency will prove abortive. The rank and file of the democratic party is not in sympathy with the ex-president. He would not be a popular candidate. And then the same reason or sentiment that defeated Grant at Chicago in 1869 would defeat Cleveland, the unwritten law that there shall be no third term.

The plain and simple republicanism of President McKinley, in contrast with his predecessors, forms a striking object lesson, and leaves the small aristocracy of the representatives of foreign monarchies at Washington, to nurse their punctilious pediculus without notice. They are treated in the true American style with perfect republican gentleness but their snobbishness is not encouraged.

Senator John P. Jones, according to latest reports, is coming to his senses, and will act with the republicans on the tariff question. He was formerly a republican but went out with the silver defection. On all other questions he is in perfect accord with the republican party, and could and should act with that party whenever a measure came up that the silver question did not enter into.

The Valley Record says bulldozing, force and thugging were introduced in the populist meeting at Medford a few days ago. Even a populist is not an angel. What a rude awakening that was for the goody goodies who saw nothing but contention and corruption in the old parties and supposed that all political goodness was in the "reform" camp.

It is now said that if President McKinley can be induced to offer, and Senator Mitchell to accept, a good appointment so that he will be out of the way as a senatorial candidate, there would be an extra session of the legislature for the purpose of electing a senator and the transaction of other necessary business of the state.

The coroner's jury said the Portland electric car that left the rails and plunged into a slough, killed four persons and injured others last Tuesday morning was running too fast. When people are in a hurry transportation companies will try to meet the requirements. The speed of street cars should be regulated by law.

It is some weeks since the tariff bill was sent to the senate, but that ponderous body has accomplished nothing in the way of bringing it to a vote. The American people cannot point with pride to its highest legislative body. It does nothing methods are making it a stretch in the public nostrils.

The Greeks drove King George into war against his sounder judgment, and now want to dethrone him because he is not victorious. This people is not fit to rule itself. What it needs is a benevolent despot.—Oregonian.

It is to be hoped the Washington Post is correct in saying "Secretary Bliss is about to de-Hoke Smithize the Interior Department." The job if well done will have merit enough to justify that phrase or any other way of putting it.—Call.

Gold for Europe.

New York, April 30.—Von Hoffman & Co. will ship \$1,000,000 in gold to Europe tomorrow; Lazard Freres, \$1,250,000 in mixed gold bar and coin; and Heidebach, Ickelheimer & Co., \$500,000. Kuhn, Loeb & Co. will ship \$500,000 in gold bars tomorrow. It is stated Kidder, Peabody & Co. will increase their previously announced shipment for next Tuesday from \$500,000 to \$750,000. It is possible it may reach \$1,000,000. A total shipment of gold to Europe for the week ending May 1 is \$9,225,000. This includes shipments announced for tomorrow—Tuesday next Kidder, Peabody & Co. will ship \$750,000, making the grand total announced as engaged for shipment from April 27 to May 1, \$9,975,000. Lazard Freres have increased their gold shipment for tomorrow from \$1,250,000 to \$1,500,000. This makes the total gold shipments tomorrow \$1,000,000. Total shipments from April 27 to May 1, \$9,225,000.

Situation At Salonica.

New York, April 30.—A Journal dispatch from Salonica on Saturday says: From Vienna to Nish in Serbia, and to the Turkish frontier all the news was of the Greek defeat and everywhere was rejoicing, because the Greek is defeated in all of Southeastern Europe. In Austria-Hungary and Serbia, the Greek individual is equal to three Oriental Jews, therefore, Austro-Hungary and Serbia all presented a broad grin at the constant news of Greek reverses. In Serbia they said: "We are delighted. We are happy and at peace for the first time in our history."

But when Salonica was reached all this was changed. There were two sides to the story. While it is true the Greeks gained a great victory at Larissa and at Larissa, the Greeks had been vanquishing the Turks at other points and destroying towns along the coast near this place.

So great was the Turkish discontent with the way the war is carried on that it is actually stated that Osman Pasha was sent to infuse new courage into the army. The hero of Plevna is very old. It is like asking Bismarck to take the field, or sending Victoria around England stump-speaking at a general election, but it is done by every Turk. His mere name is a tower of strength. Salonica is quiet among its foul smells, but all say: "The quiet is only today; God knows what will be tomorrow."

The Greek fleet of 10 war vessels only 20 miles distant, and has already bombarded two towns. It is likely any moment to give 16 hours' notice to the people to quit the town before a bombardment. Austria and Italian warships lie in the harbor ready to take care of their fellow countrymen, and all strangers requiring protection. In all houses of the better class men have their wives and children in readiness for flight, curious about and valuable put in portable packages, and yet nothing of a panic seizes the eye. Jewmen in the streets, selling goods and counting money. Albanian doormen in quilted white petticoats back in chairs in the sunshine, and in the concert-halls, music and beer together, and men and women flirt and smoke together as if the fate of Babylon will never be repeated.

Cablegrams from the field of battle are all alike—all Turkish, practically dictated by a staff officer of the commander-in-chief. All dispatches thus dictated are sent to Constantinople, and are subjected to strict censorship. This seems quite unnecessary, because Turkey must win, and win quickly, unless the powers interfere. Today she has almost double as many men in the field as the Greeks, and she has no more to take arms, while Greece has no more men.

Other correspondents here are Pierre Mila, of the Journal des Debats, of Paris; Stanhope, of the Herald; Roberts, of the American; and the London News. There are buying tents, horses and canned food and arranging to secure a military guard for three days' journey to Larissa, only one day of which is by rail.

Japan Excited.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—Advices from the Associated Press correspondent, received by the Doric from Yokohama this morning, say:

A Japanese government is aroused over the refusal of the Hawaiian government to permit Shinshu Maru emigrants to land at Honolulu, and has ordered warships to Honolulu to enforce what the Japanese emigrants choose to consider their rights. The foreign office instructed Hoga Kencho at Kobe on the 9th inst. to stop the departing of any emigrants for the islands at once.

Grave complications have arisen, according to the Japanese official newspaper, over the action of the United States government in sending the Philadelphia there. Japanese official organs claim that the cruiser has been sent as a menace to the Japanese government, and is significant in that it fortifies annexation of the islands to the United States.

Kokumin is of opinion that this refusal of the Hawaiian authorities to let Japanese emigrants land is merely the first step towards affiliation or amalgamation with the United States. It says further that the Japanese government is opposed to the union, and that it has been definitely decided to send warships to Hawaii, and that the minister for the navy will select vessels for the service from the standing squadron in the near future.

Yohuri remarks that Shinshu Maru should be sent back again under escort of Japanese warships and the landing of emigrants demanded. Should the demand be refused, Mr. Shimamura, the Japanese minister, could be instructed to offer strong objections. It also suggests that the Japanese government demand compensation from Hawaii.

Japanese official newspapers are full of war talk such as this. Chuo states that the Japanese government has decided to send warships to Hawaii to enforce what the Japanese emigrants choose to consider their rights. The foreign office instructed Hoga Kencho at Kobe on the 9th inst. to stop the departing of any emigrants for the islands at once.

No Low-Grade Teas.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—No more cheap tea will be allowed to enter this or any other United States port after the date on which the new law regarding the importation of tea takes effect. Collector Wise received yesterday a communication from the treasury department in which was included a copy of the law and regulations connected with the tea trade taken by congress and approved by the president March 2 is similar to the laws in force in England and Germany for many years, and is aimed at the importation of impure and deleterious teas.

Collectors received notice that the treasury department had shipped from New York a line of samples representing the standards fixed by the board of tea experts. The notice also stated that the collector of customs at New York had been ordered to place in one half pound packages for sale to importers and brokers, and he is instructed to do so with the samples he will receive.

They are to be sold at 25 cents a pound, the minimum price of tea to be admitted into the United States for sale hereafter.

The new law declares that from and after May 1 it will be unlawful to import teas below the newly adopted standard, for every variety in a man's pocket there are a dozen uses, and to use each in such a way as to derive the greatest benefit is a question everyone must solve for himself. Exodus of Spanish Generals.

The Havana despatches say that within the past few months there has been a regular exodus of Spanish generals from Cuba to Spain, and advices from the Philippine Islands show a similar eagerness on the part of the Spanish generals there to get back to their own country. There is a strong suspicion that many of the officers in Cuba are dissatisfied with Weyler and want to get away for that reason. So many generals have arrived in Spain lately from Cuba and the Philippines that the Madrid newspapers make serious comments. La Lucha takes the same ground in condemning the officers for abandoning active service in the field, and in an editorial urges that the government take measures to stop what grows to be a crying evil.

Diario del Ejercito, the newspaper organ of the Spanish army, published the following official figures of troops sent by Spain to Cuba from March 1, 1895 to March 21 last: Generals, 19; colonels and majors, 779; other officers, 6222; soldiers, 180,345. Total, 187,772. To the Philippine Islands the troops sent from Spain have been 26,622, including 5 generals, 19 superior officers, 725 other officers and 25,781 common soldiers. Grand total of men sent to the colonial wars in two years, 218,731.
