Cuba Must Be Free. New York, May 14.—The correspondent of the Journal has just returned from a visit to General Gomez and other Cuban leaders in Cuba, and the bearer of the following important statement by General Gomez to the American people:

Washington, May 14.—President McKinley has under earnest consideration the advisability of sending a message to Congress next week on the Cuban question.

The prospects are that considerable opposition may develop in the senate to the proposition of relief, Senator Burrows of Michigan, said today.
