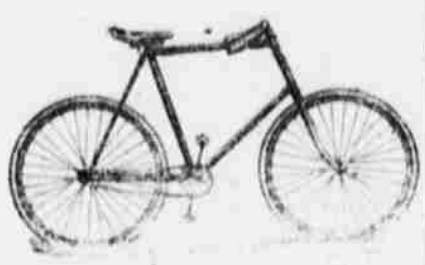

THE MALCONTENTS.

Proceedings of the "Reform" Convention at Albany.

(By our Special Correspondent.)

ALBANY, June 2, 1907.

The meeting of the Union Bimetallic party convention at the G. A. R. hall at 10 a. m. was called to order by J. C. Cooper, chairman of the state central committee, who had elected temporary chairman and J. T. Milner was elected temporary secretary. A committee of five on credentials was then appointed as follows: J. E. Milner, G. W. Guise, O. H. Kerns, J. G. Stevenson, O. E. Barnett.

The following committee on order of business was appointed: J. O. Booth, C. W. Talmage, H. B. Luce.

After a general discussion as to the advisability of holding a public or secret convention it was decided to allow representatives of the press to report the proceedings of the conference.

An adjournment was then taken until 1:30, after appointing a committee to arrange rates with the railroad companies for delegates.

At 1:30 the conference was called to order by the temporary chairman who read a short address, arraigning the gold bugs and urging a union of all reform forces.

The committee on credentials reported showing the following delegates entitled to seats: Benton—F. Dadele, Eugene Palmer, John Burnett.

The committee on order of business recommended: That the temporary officers be made permanent.

That a committee of nine be appointed to draft a declaration of principles.

That a committee of six be selected to submit plans for the organization of the union of forces in the state, and in each county.

That a committee of six members be selected to draft an appeal to the voters of Oregon for a union of forces against a common enemy.

That a committee consisting of one member from each county be selected as a committee on ways and means.

Secretary Milner suggested that the convention proceed to discuss a plan for the organization of a union party. Judge Crowell objected saying it would lead to confirm an endless discussion, and no speeches were indulged in this place, and the chairman then appointed the following committees:

Committee on declaration of principles—J. D. Stevens, W. S. Crowell, J. G. Stevenson, L. W. Guise, M. A. Miller, D. C. Sherman, H. B. Luce, J. O. Booth, D. P. Thompson.

Plan of organization—A. S. Barnes, James A. Sewell, J. D. Matlock, Eugene Palmer, W. H. Strayer, O. W. Danbar.

Appeal to voters—C. H. Baker, H. S. Han, O. H. Kerns, H. D. Norton, J. D. Kelly, J. J. Whitney.

An hour or more was taken up in waiting for the committee to report. The convention did not seem to know just what it wanted, or how to proceed.

THE PLATFORM.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, independent of the action of any other nation.

That the government shall issue all money without the intervention of banks and in quantity adequate for the needs of the people; that all money issued by the government, whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal tender for all debts public or private.

That no contract or law shall discriminate against any kind of money issued by the government. We are opposed to the issue of U. S. interest bearing bonds in lieu of peace.

We demand the redemption of Oregon from rings, and commissions, and corrupt methods and demand honest election and election laws, including a stringent registration law.

We demand that the people shall have a veto power over all legislative enactments by the use of the referendum.

We demand the election of all officers by the direct vote of the people.

We favor and advise that all nominations for municipal and county officers, including members of the legislature, shall be made by primary elections.

We recommend that this party shall be known as the Union Party and we invite all the reform forces of this state to unite with us in localizing those principles by a united effort, and we pledge ourselves to unite with reform forces in carrying out this bond of union.

The last section provoked a heated debate. Some of the delegates were opposed to forming a new party just now and declared it was a mistake. The platform was adopted, however, by a vote of 40 to 8. The evening was devoted to the discussion of detailed plans of organization and efforts to effect a union of populist, national silver party and Bryan democrats into a new union party.
