City Council Proceedings.

The common council met at the city hall in regular session Thursday evening, July 9, 1897, and transacted the following business: On calling the roll the following members were found present: Mayor Marsters; Councilmen Parks, Stanton, Moore, Fletcher, Perry, Slocum and Aiken; Marshal Cannon, Recorder Zigler. Councilman Dillard absent.

The minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

A notice from T. K. Sheridan, president of the Roseburg Water Co., calling the attention of the council to the fact that the present contract with the city for water for fire purposes would expire on the 1st day of August, '97, was read. The following committee was appointed to confer with the water company to enter into another contract for one year, with full power to act: H. C. Slocum, H. C. Stanton and C. W. Parks.

The following adon bonds were read, approved and license ordered issued: The Cleveland Distilling Co., W. H. Pitchoford, A. T. Thompson, D. W. Stephens, L. A. Harmon, and Ad. Harmon.

Quarterly reports of the treasurer and recorder were referred to the committee on expense and accounts for investigation. Marshal and recorder's reports were read and accepted and ordered filed.

A proposition was laid before the council from the county court asking that the foot of Lane street that the approach to the bridge, now under construction, would be lengthened, and with the proposition was a bill of \$14, one-half to be paid by the city for scraping down the foot of Oak street so that teams would be able to ford the river during the construction of the bridge. The matter was referred to the committee on city improvements.

The bill of the Roseburg Water Co. for water for the month of May, June and July was laid on the table for one month.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned to meet August 5th, 1897.

In the County Court.

In the matter of proposals for putting in steel lattice cells in the county jail, four bids were opened: Churchill, Woolley & McKenzie, \$2463; F. F. Patterson, \$1300, \$1080, \$975; Wylie Pilkington, \$1383, \$1142; Duesold, Safe & Lock Co., \$1500, \$1270, \$1100, \$1000, \$975, \$875. No action yet taken by the court.

Verrellman & Nelson of Gardiner granted a liquor license.

In the matter of the Elk creek road around Red Hill to Jackson county line, \$303 was appropriated.

In the matter of circuit court reporter, the county court recommends as follows: Whereas, the expense of a court reporter in the circuit court is a large and in many cases an unnecessary expense, and whereas the expense is in most instances borne by the tax payers of the county, this court most earnestly recommends to the circuit judge that in civil cases no report be made unless the parties to the case deposit with the clerk the money necessary to defray the fees of the reporter, or make some arrangements with the reporter whereby the county will not be liable for the reporter's fee.

And further recommend that the circuit court refuse to employ a reporter in the minor criminal cases and that only the more important criminal cases be reported when there is a probability of an appeal to the supreme court.

And we further recommend that no jurymen be excused by the circuit judge only in cases of sickness.

To the Farmers of Douglas County.

Mr. Asher Marks of this city has received a proposition from a syndicate of capitalists, who express their willingness to establish a best sugar manufacturing plant at some suitable point therefor on the line of the S. P. railroad, to be operated in the fall of 1898, provided that it can be shown at an early date, that a sufficient acreage to supply the requisite quantity of beet required to sustain said factory will be devoted next and succeeding years to their culture. It will require from 3000 acres the first year, to 5000 acres in succeeding years to operate the proposed plant, which would furnish first year from 45 to 50,000 tons on an average yield; the lands of Douglas county adjacent to the railroad line between Drain and Riddle stations can profitably raise beets as a portion of their annual crop and their owners can well afford to come forward now and state individually what amount of land each will devote annually to the product of beets. This much co-operation on the part of the farmers is necessary to be ascertained at this time in order to determine whether this valuable industry can be obtained for Douglas county, or will you stand idly by and see it go to some other community. Therefore, believing that the establishment of this new industry would largely increase the prosperity of Douglas county by furnishing profitable labor to thousands of people during the summer and fall seasons, and greatly to the value of real estate and as a matter of fact, benefit the whole state of Oregon by producing our own sugar, the undersigned invite all the farmers from Riddle to Drain to attend a mass meeting at the court house in Roseburg on Saturday, July 17th, at 1 o'clock p. m., to thoroughly discuss
