The warmest nights on record at Roseburg, records of this office, 30 years, occurred during the present month (August 1897) being those of the 19th, lowest, 67 degrees, 20th, lowest 67 degrees, 21st, lowest 68 degrees.

August having highest minimum temperature was that of 1891, the lowest for the month being 50 degrees. August having lowest minimum was that of 1882 the lowest for the month being 40 degrees. The highest monthly mean on record, August 1897, 70 degrees, and July 1896, 71 degrees. The lowest monthly mean, July 1881, 63 degrees, August 1881, 63 degrees. Least highest temperature in any July or August, July 1878, 81 degrees, August 1883, 86 degrees. Lowest maximum temperature, July 1895, 62 degrees, August 1885, 69 degrees.

There must be something wrong in the atmosphere over in Lane county. John A. Holt of Coburg is bound over on a charge of rape, the victim being his 14-year-old daughter. Frank Reid was arrested and taken before the justice of the peace at Cottage Grove, charged with rape on a 10-year-old child. The officers had to keep close watch of their prisoner to prevent a lynching bee.

Ed Cameron was received at the county jail Tuesday, being committed from Canas Valley to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of larceny from Cook's store.

The highest point reached by the thermometer at the station here was 98 degrees, and the minimum for the hottest night 68 degrees. We lead Portland a degree or two for the hottest day, but that city led by four degrees for the hottest night.

Mr. G. W. Kimball of Roseburg, who has been spending the past month in Ashland and vicinity, left on Saturday evening for the coast. Mr. Kimball goes to spend a few weeks at Sandon and the Garden of the Gods, in Coos county.—Tidings.

Superintendent Douglas Waite made the apportionment of state and county school money last week. The amount was \$1.50 per capita. There are 3383 school children in the county and the total amount apportioned \$5074.50. The per capita was 25 cents greater than last year.

Hon. E. B. Dufur, state senator from Wasco county, was in the city Monday on legal business. Senator Dufur was the democratic member of the senate who was generally supposed to be ready with vote and voice to further the interests of Senator Mitchell at the late "half session."

G. M. Stroud, better known as "Tap" Stroud, grand lecturer of the Masons, has been in the city several days. He came on the Coos Bay stage having been over on the coast lecturing before the Masonic lodge there. His mission here was two-fold, namely, to pay an official visit to the local lodge and to visit the family of his son, E. J. Stroud, on Mosher street.

The death of Robert McEwan in the wreck Sunday spreads a gloom over this community, not only in railroad circles but throughout the entire neighborhood. Mr. McEwan married Miss Kate Biew of this place April 10, 1896. His remains were taken to Muddy cemetery for interment Tuesday, Rev. McFarland of this place officiating. He carried a policy in the Fireman's for \$1,500.—Junction City Times.

Professor Hamlin attended the institute at Gardiner. He went on his wheel to Scottsburg returning the same way. He was accompanied from Scottsburg to Elktion on the return trip by Professor Ackerman of Portland, also on a wheel. Coming down a grade, Ackerman, who was in front, had a fall. Hamlin, to avoid running over his companion, steered for the bank and turned a somersault. They walked the rest of the way to Elktion.

A young son of Casper Zierolf, a farmer living about 12 miles south of Cottage Grove, met with a singular accident last week. He went for a cow on horseback, and as he did not return in season, search was made for him. He was found lying in the road unconscious, his head and shoulders bruised, and since then has not been conscious. The saddle was badly broken, which indicates that the horse probably reared and fell with him.

Hon. Thomas H. Tongue, congressman from this district, went over to Myrtle Point last week. The citizens there sent a team and buggy to meet the distinguished guest, who was a passenger on the stage, that he might have an easier ride into town. But there was a sick lady also a passenger and Mr. Tongue insisted that the lady should be transferred to the buggy and he would follow on the stage, a very graceful act on the part of the congressman.

While hunting in the Coast range about 50 miles west of here this week, Don Flournoy met with a severe and painful accident. On standing his rifle against a tree it slipped and started down the steep hill side, breech first, at a lively rate. Don grabbed it by the muzzle just as the hammer struck a rock, and a second later a bullet crashed through his thumb and passed within an inch of his head. He hastened to town and Dr. Du Gas, assisted by Dr. Hoover, amputated the injured thumb last evening.

At the Presbyterian Church Sunday morning, the Young People's church conducted a song service. Mr. O. P. Coeshow addressed the young people upon the subject of the use and beauty of music. Mr. M. McCoy spoke upon Thoughtfulness and Duty. Miss Ruby Bailey read a selected poem. Miss Ruby Gordon sang a solo. Mrs. Judge Fullerton entertained the young people of the church Thursday evening. Music and games were the order of the evening, which closed with dainty refreshments daintily served by the hostess.

The Hon. Ringer Hermann, commissioner of the general land office, was in Ashland yesterday, looking hale, happy and hearty. He was on his way to attend a conference of the Supervisors of the Forest Reserves, from Arizona, New Mexico and California that will meet in San Francisco, and will return in a few days. The Federal administration is particularly fortunate in having a commissioner of the general land office so well versed, thorough and up-to-date in the various intricacies connected with the details, wants and necessities of the public domain and its protection.—Tidings.

Thursday morning George Kerns, a constable, arrested and brought to Grants Pass, from Wolf Creek, Mr. Kirk who some days ago, was reported as having accidentally shot Ed Jones, a young man 22 years of age, near Golden, Josephine county, in the brush, thinking he was a deer. Kirk has, it is said, been making some peculiar statements lately, saying, as reported, that had he not shot Jones he would have killed himself, and that there were some jealousies of old standing between the two men. Kirk had an examination at Grants Pass on the charge of murder and was held to the grand jury. Jones, the murdered man, is not very well known. He came to Wolf Creek, last winter from La Grande, Colorado.

Elks' Picnic.

The local lodge of Elks maintained the reputation of the order as being royal entertainers on Sunday last on the occasion of the picnic and barbecue at Winchester. In anticipation of a crowd the S. P. Co. had placed two extra cars on the local train on that morning, and these and the regular cars were well filled with Elks' and their guests; no much so that Conductor Farrell had to get a hustle on to get through the train before the picnickers reached their destination on the North Umpqua. The place provided for the picnic was in the grove just above Winchester. An ideal spot it was, the spreading branches of the giant oaks affording abundant shade and the river, because of the dam, being like a lake, its placid waters decidedly inviting and offsetting in some degree the rays of the sun then giving us a hot spell. Some of the Elks had left town in the "tree snags" hours with a wagon load of provisions, lemons, ice and such, to say nothing of the young elk to be barbecued, so that when the main army arrived the roasting was well under way and the tables constructed.

The animal was received with due honors and promptly decorated with the royal purple. Trouble At Oakland.

U. M. Gallagher and Lorenzo Van Arberg, farmers living a few miles west of Oakland, got into a little difficulty that may result in the death of the latter. Deputy Prosecutor Riddle was sent for and went over Tuesday. An information was filed and a warrant issued thereon for the arrest of Gallagher. It seems that there was an old feud between the men which culminated as above. On Monday last Van Arberg noticed a log that contained a number of wood rat nests, and concluded to fire the log and destroy the nests. While he was bent over, Gallagher came along and struck Van Arberg on the back and several times on the head with a club. He then took him to his own house, and finding that he had injured the old man took him to Oakland in the evening and turned him over to Dr. Page. Van Arberg's injuries may prove fatal. He is 74 years old.

LATER.—Gallagher is under arrest and the preliminary examination will take place today. Deputy Riddle went over to look after the interests of the state and Geo. M. Brown for the defense.

Squirrel poison at Marsters.

Commissioner Wilson Dead.

On Friday last at 3 p. m., W. L. Wilson, one of the county commissioners of Douglas county, died at his home near Riddle. Mr. Wilson had for some time suffered from cancer of the face, and last April went to Portland and submitted to an operation, which was thought to be successful. During the session of the county court in July, Mr. Wilson complained of pains in the face and neck which he thought was neuralgia, but which proved to be the reappearance of the cancer and it was soon evident that it was but a question of a short time when the end must come. Everything possible was done to relieve the suffering of the patient, but without avail and finally the message of the "grim reaper" called the sufferer home. The funeral took place on Sunday under the auspices of Canyonville lodge of which deceased was an honored member, and delegations were present from Roseburg and Myrtle Creek. Judge A. F. Stearns, County Clerk J. H. Shupe, W. T. Wright, D. S. K. Buick, Howard Martin and B. W. Strong were present from here. Rev. W. J. Miller will preach the funeral sermon at Riddle, September 5.

Deceased was born May 3rd, 1832, in Missouri, crossed the plains to Oregon in 1845, and settled in Coos creek valley, being one of the early pioneers. He was married in 1856 to Miss Hulda Mynatt, who died in 1893. He was married to Miss Hattie Haskins in 1891, by whom he had 7 children, 3 boys and 4 girls, all of whom survive him, excepting one son. He had been a consistent Christian and member of the Baptist church since 1857, an honored citizen and a good neighbor. He was elected commissioner of Douglas county in June 1894, his term expiring until July 1, 1898.

Speaking of the G. A. R. reunion at Myrtle Point last week, the Enterprise says: "The Commander then introduced the orator of the day, Congressman Thos. H. Tongue, who in his eloquent, earnest and forcible manner, delivered one of the best addresses to the G. A. R. that was ever listened too in this county."
