Of the "jamboree," as it calls it, of Pennington's chief police commissioner and chief of police, the Democratic Times, of Jacksonville, makes light, saying, "Hundreds of officials have indulged in much worse escapades." It seems to me, says the Oregonian, that this method of apology is of doubtful value.

The Grass Valley Journal nominates the Hon. T. T. Geer for governor and the Newberg Graphic seconds the same. We do not believe that there is a republican within the limits of our state that is better qualified to grace the gubernatorial chair than the Hon. T. T. Geer, and we most heartily second the proposition.—Sheridan Sun.

Senators Pettigrew, Mantle and Dubois should hasten their report on the true condition of gold-ridden Japan in time to warn the Chilean statesman who are now buying gold in London preparatory to carrying out their plan for a change in monetary standard. But perhaps their report is not as favorable to silver as they expected.

The postoffice department has sent circulars to postmasters, informing them that it is not permissible to write upon third or fourth class matter or its wrapper, or to print or write upon second-class matter or its wrapper directions relative to the delivery thereof, inconsistent with the postal regulations; consequently, directions to deliver to some indefinite address as to a "druggist" or "physician" if the matter be undelivered to the addressee, must in all cases be disregarded by the postmaster at the office of address. Postmasters are directed to inform the sender of this effect, and that after March 1, 1898, matter addressed in the foregoing manner will be held to be unmailable.

Silver sold in the New York market on the 7th inst. at 90 cents an ounce for commercial bars. This is the highest price since July last, and represents an advance of nearly 9 cents an ounce since September 1. The strength exhibited for the market for silver recently is ascribed to large silver shipments from London to Russia, which country has been for some time past at work putting her currency upon a metallic basis; a revival in volume of the demand from China, a continued good demand from India, and an increasing demand for use in the arts. The production of silver at the same time has not increased.

This recipe for perpetual motion comes from California. Take a murderer. Mix with one good criminal lawyer. Convict murderer. Pass sentence of death. Appeal to supreme court. Get a remittitur, writ of replevin, order to show probable cause, order to maintain collateral-hauser, or some other legal padlock on the sheriff to prevent hanging. Argue it to a snitch. Have day of execution set against. Make another appeal. Get another doctory from the supreme court. Fight that to a snitch. Repeat the process as often as desired, and if the people don't hang the lawyer, and the murderer doesn't die of old age, power can be generated in unlimited quantities for an unlimited time.—Chicago Journal.

The people who are urging immediate legislation for increase of the revenue are doing an injustice to the existing law and to business interests of the country. The earnings under the new law have grown with marked rapidity, beginning with \$19,000,000 in August, and running up to over \$25,000,000 in November. The receipts now are within about \$5,000,000 a month of the expenditures, and when it is remembered that the receipts from sugar, wool, and excises will not begin to be felt until after the month of January, but will average \$6,000,000 or \$7,000,000 a month, all told, it will be seen that there is good reason to believe that the law will pay for its own maintenance, and that the demand for additional legislation at the present time is unfair and unjust. At least the law should be given sufficient time to show what it can do.—Ex.

Monument for Silver Lake Victims. There is now being made in Eugene a large marble monument, the design of which was copied from a granite sarcophagus in the Forest Lawn cemetery of Buffalo, New York. The monument is to be erected to the memory of the 43 persons who lost their lives in the Silver Lake landslide, Christmas Eve, 1894. The monument proper consists of a marble base on which rests the die. On this will be carved the name and date of birth of each victim of the awful disaster. Next comes the cap, and in an appropriate place on it will be inscribed: "Erected by friends to the memory of those who perished in the fire of Silver Lake, Oregon, December 21, 1894."

On the face and back of the die will be two finely carved columns. The whole is surmounted by a plinth and draped over. When completed the monument will rest on two bases of Lake county stone, and will stand 12 1/2 feet high. The stone will be hauled across the mountains over the Military road as soon as possible next spring. Three four-horse teams will be required to perform the task, as the various parts will weigh over five tons, and the masonry will be long and hard to haul. It will be shipped by slipping to Ashland or Ager and hauling from there over the mountains.

Origin of the Word "Hoodlum."

The old proofreader was holding forth upon the question of typographical errors and their occasional influence on posterity. "The word 'hoodlum' is an instance of this," he said, as he knocked the ash out of his pipe. "Out in San Francisco twenty five years ago there was a notorious character named Muldoon, who was the leader of a gang of young ruffians. They were a terror to the community, and about as tough a lot of citizens as you could find on the coast. A reporter who had been assigned to a story in which they had figured, undertook to coin a word designating the gang. He reversed the name of the leader, and referred to them as 'hoodlums.' The compositor mistook the 'm' for an 'l,' and as hoodlums the word passed the proofreader. And now 'hoodlum' is a recognized word, and will probably survive."—Philadelphia Record.
