## January Weather.

The following data for the month of January covering a period of 20 years, have been compiled from the weather bureau records at Roseburg, Oregon, and is farnished by Observer Gibson:

TEMPERATURE. Mean or normal temperature, 40. The warmest month was that of 1896, with an average of 44. The coldest month was that of 1888, with an average of 35.

The highest temperature was 71 on 26th 1888. The lowest temperature was 6, on 16th, 1888. Average date on which first guards were apprehensive of his slight-skilling frost occurred in autumn, October 1884 and 1885. The lowest temperature was 6, on 1886 and 1888. The least monthly precipitation was 1.66 inches in 1807. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 3 05 inches on 11th and 12th, 1881, and 23rd and 24th, 1890. The greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive bours, (record extending to winter of 1884-5 only) was 2.2 inches on 2nd and 6th, 1890. Average number of clear days, 4;

partly cloudy days, 0; cloudy days, 18.

The prevailing winds have been from the south. The highest velocity of the wind was 30 miles from the south on 9th, 1878 and 27th, 1888.

DURRANT DEAD.

Justice Claimed Its Victim Last Friday.

After Nearly Three Years of "the Laws Delays" the Arch-fiend Pays the Death Penalty.

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
