can never get together by discussing
their grievances nor by grumbling over
technical questions of regularity.—Cor-

The fact that silver is mined in many
countries in conjunction with copper,
lead and other ores adds greatly to its
cheapness of production. Edward At-
kinson, the statistician, presents figures
showing that its cost to mine ranges
from 45 down to 12 1/2 cents per ounce,
and even less in some cases. In spite of
the United States low price of the metal, its
mining goes on to an enormous extent
in the English Isles alone producing it last
year to the extent of \$76,069,236.

A scandal is agitating the Italian aris-
tocracy. The celebrated duca house of
Littab, Viscount Avez, has renounced its
Italian nationality. The duke married
Countess Rosa Laris, a noted beauty,
by whom he had two daughters, and some
time afterward a boy. The duke repudiated
the boy's paternity and accuses a very
high person. He has established the
fact in the courts that the child is
not his, but as divorce does not exist in
Italy, the duke has become a French
citizen, and has instituted proceedings.

Mr Mackay invites republican electors
to participate in the primaries called by
the republican committee and assures
them that their votes shall be counted
as voted. That is all that is asked. If
Mr. Mackay and his associates do that
there can be no criticism by republicans.

What we of the country ask is that the
republican electors go to the primaries
as republicans, vote as republicans,
come away as republicans, go to the
polls in June as republicans and vote
the republican ticket. That is what we
in Washington county intend to do.
Anything short of that will be a stab at
sound money.—Hillsboro Independent.

Of course in a conflict between Eng-
land and Japan on the one hand and
Germany, Russia and France on the
other on the Chinese question the sym-
pathy of the United States would be on
the side of the former coalition. The
business interest of this country lies in
the maintenance of the present condi-
tions in China, and England and Japan
will endeavor to preserve this situation.
If the policy of dismemberment which
the triple league appears to have in view
should be carried out the favorable com-
mercial treaties which the United States
has with China would lapse, to the seri-
ous injury of this country. The moral
support of the United States will be
given to the dual combination, but our
policy of keeping out of entangling al-
liances with foreign nations will prevent
us from furnishing any physical aid.—
Globe Democrat.

A LETTER.

Pertaining to the Position of Hon.
H. W. Corbett, During the At-
tempted Organization of Leg-
islature of Oregon.

The following letter was printed for
information of senators at Washington,
D. C.:

PORTLAND, OR., December 27, 1897.
Senator H. W. Corbett, Washington,
D. C.—My Dear Senator: I have been
advised by Mr. McCamant, of this city,
that an effort is being made in Washing-
ton to create prejudice against you and
your right to a seat in the senate, by
charging you with the responsibility for
the failure of organization of the last leg-
islature of this state.

I think I am in a position to answer as
to the truth or falsity of his charge, and
I have no hesitation in stating "emphati-
cally that there is no truth whatever in
the charge. I had the honor to be in
correspondence with you while presiding
over the State Senate and while presiding
for the organization of the house, and
also had frequent interviews with you
concerning the unfortunate middle the
legislature got into. In all these com-
munications, verbal and otherwise, you
indicated an earnest desire to see the
legislature properly organized, because
of various matters of economic legisla-
tion beneficial to the city of Portland and
in a general way to the State of Oregon
that you were greatly interested in.

You also indicated a desire to have the
legislature elect a senator, and seemed
particularly anxious that it should be
some one from Multnomah county, in-
cluding myself, to support any clean,
sound republican that could be elected,
mentioning among the names of the
prominent men of this state whom you
thought available for that purpose,
Judge S. A. Lowell, of Pendleton; Hon.
T. I. Geer, of Macleay, and Judge F. A.
Moore, of St. Helens. I know that
there was no effort on your part to pre-
vent an election of senator so as to se-
cure your own appointment by the Gov-
ernor. Your appointment by the Gov-
ernor was made by him without any so-
licitation on your part. I know this to
be a fact because the Governor discussed
the subject with me while I was still at
Salem among the members of the legisla-
ture had dispersed and returned to their
homes, and this statement was made to
me by the Governor unqualifiedly. The
charge that is now being made against
you and sought to be used to prevent
the state from recognizing you as a mem-
ber of that body is as base as it is ground-
less.

I feel that I ought to write you this in
justice to yourself. Very truly yours,
