Weekly Crop Bulletin.
WESTERN OREGON.
Weather.—Rain fell in the northern
portion and along the coast Monday
night, and a few sprinkles of Rain fell on
Friday and Saturday; the total for the
week was less than .10 of an inch. The
temperature has been normal in the
northern portion and below the normal
in the southern, averaging 53 in the
former and 52 in the latter. The aver-
age for the week in Western Oregon was
53, which is 1.0 lower than for the pre-
ceding week and the same as it was in
the corresponding week last year. The
highest temperature during the week
was 73, on Sunday. The lowest 33 at
Roseburg on Wednesday. Light frosts
occurred on Wednesday morning.
Crops.—Seeding of spring wheat and
oats on the lowlands will be finished
this week. Fall and winter sown wheat
and oats are farther advanced than usual.
Spring sown grain is making excellent
growth. Reports indicate that the grain
acreage is larger than usual in all
sections. The hay crop is most prom-
ising; grass has good growth and indicates
a large yield. Hops are growing rapidly;
they are up the poles and onto the
wires in many yards.
The fruit prospects continue to be
most excellent, except peaches. The
peach crop will not be a full one in all
sections, but in the real peach growing
district a good crop is now indicated.
Apple and quince trees are in full bloom.
Fruit has set on other varieties of trees.
Cherries are as large as peas. The
prune trees are overloaded with small,
well-set fruit. Wild strawberries are
ripening. Cultivated strawberries are
well set. Gooseberries will soon be
ready for use. Many varieties of roses
are in full bloom.
The lambing season is over and could
not be more successful. Shearing con-
tinues and large fine fleeces are secured.
Stock is fat.
Gardens are making rapid growth.
Potato planting is yet in progress.
Everything is promising.
Rain in the southern counties would
prove of benefit, and general rain
throughout the entire western portion of
the state within the next ten days would
be of value. More rain is probable be-
fore the real dry season sets in.

THE TRAITOR FLED.
Socialist Editor's Narrow Escape
From a Mob.
FORT SCOTT, Kan., May 1.—George E.
Bowman, an associate editor of the Ap-
peal to Reason, a socialist paper, pub-
lished at Girard, and who was socialist
candidate for lieutenant-governor of
Kansas two years ago, has been com-
pelled to flee from Girard to save
his life from a mob of citizens, incen-
ded at an article he wrote for the paper.
While sitting in the newspaper office, he
was notified by a friend of the approach
of a mob, which had a rope, intending
to hang him. He escaped through the
rear door, and ran to this city, a distance
of 23 miles, without money or baggage.
Chief Editor Wayland had grave fears of
a repetition of the Lovjiv affair with
his newspaper office. The article which
so incensed the people referred to the
national flag as a piece of painted rat-
tled to a stick. He was criticizing the
worship of the flag about the regar's for
fellow-creatures. Bowman came from
Providence, R. I., about a year ago. He
has left here, and is en route to Wash-
ington state.

The Storm in Iowa.
STOCK CITY, Ia., May 1.—The storm
which originated last evening near Val-
paraiso Neb., crossed the Missouri river
to South Dakota, where it struck Ek-
born and Richland, and finally found
up in Northern Iowa. In Iowa, the vil-
lages of Sheldon, Alta, Westfield, Akron,
Mallard, Archer and Maurice suffered.
Another branch of the storm struck Oer,
Whitney and Smithland, but did com-
paratively little damage. John P. John-
son, a farmer near Richland, was the
only one killed. In the path of the
storm, many houses are demolished and
crops have suffered from the hail which
accompanied it. At Maurice, two eleva-
tors and the depot were blown down.

Death in a Storm.
CHICAGO, May 1.—Specials to the Time
Herald report a storm last night extend-
ing over parts of South Dakota and Iowa.
South Dakota reports a death toll of 18,
and a property loss of \$100,000. In
Northwest Iowa, the towns of Pringhar,
Harty and Curlew were badly wrecked,
Harty being almost completely destroyed.
Several people in that section are
reported killed, but details are meager.
The town of Macedonia, near Council
Bluffs, is badly wrecked, but no loss is
reported there.

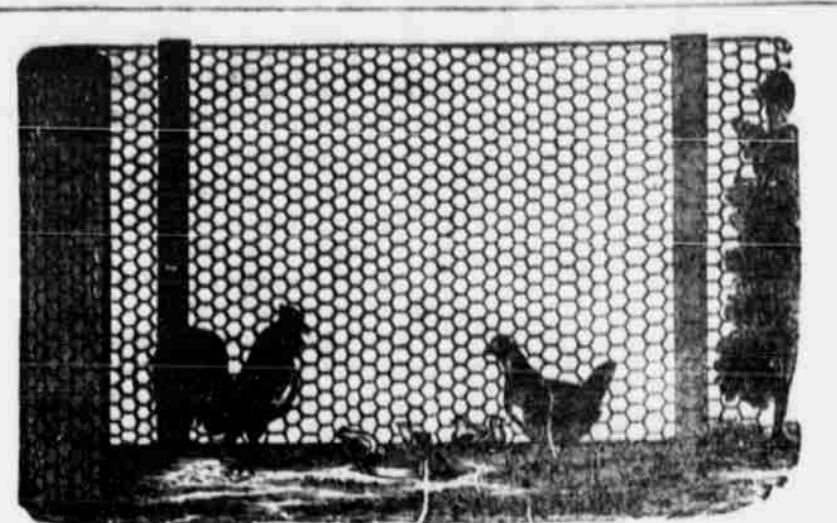
