These official gentlemen came here to look up road matters in order that we can get away from home and that they may have a rest from the constant stream of correspondence. The former object is commendable. The latter is certainly devoutly to be wished.
 "Over here we have
 A country, 'tis a glorious land,
 The pond Pacific chafes her strand,
 We hear the dark breakers roar;
 And living round our ample lakes,
 How many a lovely prospect lies.
 All in Nature's wildest grandeur dressed,
 Enamelled in her loveliest dyes."
 But nobody can get here, because we have no roads. We have some madden efforts at roads. As a rule the men who made an effort failed. The worst failures were in location, and in too many instances, level minded people with normal heads on their shoulders and willing to correct these inexcusable blunders, build a road and survey and plot it for record afterward. Supervisor Anderson claims that he was so instructed. The self constituted local would-be absolute monarchs claim the Judge and Commissioner Thompson advised the building of the road on or near survey and if, when built, it developed that a better line could be found which accommodates the whole community to the greatest possible extent, then the work done could be abandoned and a new line of road be built. Here is the situation as it stands. You take your choice. I take Anderson's statement because I know that he won't lie. He on very rare occasions under heavy pressure will almost swear, but he is positively will not do. Therefore, the other fellows must have misunderstood, notwithstanding their infallibility in all matters, social, religious, political and philosophical.

After the oil and soap were carried to the top of the grades one man went behind the wagon and the driver lashed the team with whip and tongue, they got the wagon through, and yet this road has cost thousands of dollars. These are facts gentlemen, and yet when road work is proposed, these men, who led in the hills we suffer have the insuperable gall to push themselves forward as the leaders of the job and if a county official appears on the scene there they are. We are weary, oh so weary, of it all. We did not intend ever to tell of our trials but the occasion calls for the facts.
