#### FATAL TRAGEDY IN THE CANYON

##### Brakeman Steve Willis Crushed to Death in a Wreck

Roseburg is again in mourning over the untimely death of one of her popular young railroad men.

At 11:45 a. m. yesterday, Sunday June 12th, at Tunnel No. 5, about 9 miles north of Gresham, the engine pulling the regular northbound freight, in charge of Conductor Sam Henderson, suddenly left the track and turned over in the ditch, instantly killing the head brakeman, Steve Willis. Willis, in company with Brakeman Al Veatch, was riding on the pit when the engine suddenly left the track. Willis either jumped or was thrown from his seat at the moment the engine rolled over on its side and was caught under the engine and instantly crushed to death.

Mr. Veatch who was also on the pilot clung to his seat and escaped with slight injuries. Engineer Dan Dempsey and Fireman Wm Everts, who were in charge of the engine, remained at their posts and escaped with slight injury.

No one appears to be certain of the cause of the wreck, but it is supposed that the heavy engine striking the curve caused the rails to spread and the engine to leave the track. Five or six of the cars following the engine were demolished, and as usual in such wrecks, it appears miraculous that any one about the engine escaped instant death. Mr. Willis who was but 24 years of age, was the only son of Judge and Mrs. Wm. H. Willis of this city and leaves a wife and little child and a host of friends to mourn his untimely death. The remains were brought to this city on the morning and the funeral takes place from the home of Judge Wm. R. Willis at 4 o'clock this afternoon, the interment being in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

This tragedy adds another chapter, to the already long history of fatal accidents, caused in a great many instances by the wretched condition of the track and road-bed of the Southern Pacific in Oregon.

#### CHAS. FIESTER HANGED.

##### Carried to the Gallows on a Board in an Unconscious Condition—Confined in the Jail Three Years.

(From the Grants Pass Observer.)

Chas. Fiester was hanged at 1:10 p. m. on Friday, June 10, and his neck was broken. The condemned man collapsed the morning and lay like a dead man upon his cot. His eyes rolled and he breathed hard, so that when 10 o'clock, the time of execution was at hand, Sheriff Hiatt decided to wait until 11 o'clock. The conditions were the same, however, at 11, and Fiester was strapped to a board and carried to the scaffold. He didn't seem to be conscious of what was going on and at 1:10 the trap was sprung.

**FIESTER'S CRIME.**

On Sunday afternoon, May 19, 1895, Fiester and his wife with two of their small children, left Grants Pass for Merlin going on foot on the railroad track. The couple had been separated for some and before starting had made up their differences and decided to live together again. On their way down, they quarreled and the wife started back when Fiester caught her and dragged her down to a small pool of water and held her under until she was strangled to death. Some strangers coming along soon after found the body and came in to town to report his discovery. Fiester was arrested and at his trial the following September pleaded insanity but was found guilty and on October 30, 1895, was sentenced to hang on November 29, 1895. But a few days before the time of execution arrived Fiester's attorney, R. G. Smith, succeeded in securing a stay of execution pending an appeal to the supreme court. About this time Fiester went "crazy." He played his crazy act for more than a year and the case was not pushed in the supreme court until the first of this year when the verdict of the lower court was sustained. The condemned man has been fearful of death from the start and when sentenced at the last term of the circuit court he broke down and wept like a child. His crime was committed over three years ago.

#### COURT HOUSE BURNED.

##### Polk County's Temple of Justice in Ashes.

DALLAS, June 10th 1895.—The Polk county court, at Dallas, is a mass of smoldering ruins. It was entirely consumed this morning between 2 o'clock and daylight by a fire of incendiary origin. A great many of the county's valuable records are lost. The papers of the county clerk were in a fire proof vault and were not injured and the records of the county treasurer are probably safe; the others were destroyed in the conflagration.

The fire was discovered at 2 o'clock this morning, but at that time the flames had gained such headway that to combat them was an impossibility. Great lurid tongues of fire were bursting from every part of the building and no intelligent guess can be given as to what part of the structure was burning first. The front plate on the door to the sheriff's office was blown off and it is believed from this that the door was blown open by dynamite and afterwards set on fire, or probably the fire followed the explosion as a natural sequence.

Every one believes the fire to have been the work of an incendiary, but there are no well defined suspicions as to who the culprit is.

It is believed that all the records and ballots of the election were destroyed, but as the official count had been made and certified to, the loss cannot possibly effect the result.

Charles Morris Dead.

Charles Morris, father of Richard Morris, the well-known cattle buyer of this city, died at Oakland, Douglas county, this date, at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, age about 70 years.

His demise was caused by paralysis of which he suffered for some time. The deceased resided in Salem for several years where he was proprietor of a meat-market. Twelve years ago he left Salem and went to Oakland where he has since lived.

Those of the family who survive him are his wife and two sons and a daughter, viz: Richard, of Salem, Gas, a telegraph operator at Ashland, Jackson county, and Mrs. Jessie Ray, of Oakland.

He will be buried at Dallas, Polk county, tomorrow.

A. D. Palmer, of this city is a brother-in-law of the deceased.—Eugene Register.
