REPUBLICAN GAINS IN DOUGLAS COUNTY.

We give in this issue the complete official returns of the election for this county, June 6th. While there is a marked falling off of the vote as compared with the vote of two years ago, it shows decided gains for the republican party over the opposition. It will be noticed that there were five candidates on the ticket who were candidates on the ticket for the same office two years ago, and a comparison of the vote of these candidates at the last election with their vote of two years ago will show the difference in strength of the two parties.

Take the vote for congressman. Two years ago the combined vote of the democrats and populists gave a plurality against Tongue of 555 votes. At the last election the combined plurality against Mr. Tongue was but 245, showing a republican gain of 310.

Take next the office of county clerk. Two years ago the combined plurality against Mr. Shupe for this office was 481. In 1898 the plurality against him was 210. A republican gain on this office. For assessor Mr. Britt was the republican candidate at both elections. In 1896 the combined plurality against Mr. Britt was 456. In 1898 for the same office the combined opposition could muster but 263 against him. A net gain for the republicans of 253. Douglas Waite for school superintendent was also a candidate at both elections. In 1897 the combined vote of the democrats and populists would have given him a majority of 824. At the election of this year this majority was wiped out and a majority of 51 given for Mr. Hamilton, as a net gain of \$55. Two years ago Mr. Hayden and Mr. Thiel were candidates for surveyor as they were in 1898. If Mr. Thiel had received the popular vote in 1898 as he did in 1895, his plurality would have been 517. At the election of 1898 Mr. Thiel had a plurality of but 175, a net gain for the republicans of 341. The average gain of the republicans as shown by these five offices is 415. The result, therefore, of the election in Douglas county shows about the same gain for the republican party as is shown in other counties in the state.

Mr. F. A. Benson, will engage in the practice of law in this city, and will occupy the rooms in the Review building now occupied by Judge Hamilton. No man in Douglas county is better acquainted with the affairs of the county than Mr. Benson and no man in the county enjoys to a greater extent than he, the confidence of the people. He will have a large business from the first, and we predict for him a large measure of success.

Our correspondents appear to be taking a rest after the election. We hope they will soon get into the harness again. A good corps of correspondents is the life of a country newspaper and the PLAINDEALER has had during the past year a very effective corps of news gatherers. There are yet two or three localities in the county in which we are not represented. Will not some friend help us a little once or twice a week.

We have been informed that Mr. Gray, county clerk elect, promised the voters that if elected he would run the office of county clerk at a total expense to the taxpayers of \$1200 per year. This will be quite a saving to the taxpayers, and as Mr. Gray is a man of his word, he will no doubt do as he promised.

Douglas county gave Clinton, prob., candidate for governor, 62 votes; Lucie, middle-of-the-road pop., 30; for secretary of state, Davis, prob., 58; Wakefield, pop., 40; for treasurer, Sears, pop., 87; Votaw, prob., 34; for superintendent, Enerick, prob., 69; Hosmer, 56; for state printer, Grace, pop., 68; McDaniel, prob., 49; for justice of the supreme court, Hackleman, prob., 63; for attorney general, Bright, 67; congressman, Hill, pop., 67; Pedersen, prob., 55. The figures are not included in the table of the official votes published in this issue.

ON FAMINE RATIONS.

Off Santiago de Cuba, June 11, via Kingston, June 12. — Rear Admiral Sampson and Commodore Schley with their combined forces are slowly but surely placing such a network about Santiago and are cutting off so effectively every source of outside aid that within a short time starvation's tapping will give way to death's solid knock for admittance at the doors of the ill-fated place. Within three days three separate sources of supply and reinforcement have been cut off, and Santiago is now isolated from the world and is down to famine rations.

When Admiral Cervera arrived at Santiago with his fleet, the people welcomed him for the relief they thought he would bring, but instead of food he brought them 700 more men to feed. The only aid he had to offer was tons of ammunition in his ships' magazines. A map of the harbor furnished today by spies shows that after the bombardment of the harbor forts by Schley, the Spanish cruises Reina Mercedes, which was disabled, was towed into the bay behind the Socapa battery, where she lies with two torpedoes. Half a mile further up the Vizcaya commands with her broadside two narrow entrances to the east and west of Cayosmith. Half a mile north and at the gate of the third narrow entrance lies the Almirante Oquendo, and half a mile to the northwest are the Cristobal Colon and Maria Teresa.

Transports Will be Convoys

WASHINGTON, June 14.—On recommendation of General Merritt, it has been decided to give the second expedition to the Philippines a naval convoy from Honolulu to Manila. While in the opinion of those who are in a position to know, the armed convoy is scarcely deemed necessary, it is thought to be best not to take any unnecessary chances where the lives of so many men are involved. What naval vessels will convey the transports could not be ascertained tonight, but the [?] possibility will be one of them.

Nearly Due at Manila.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—General Merritt has brought the second installment of his force into readiness, and it sails for Manila tomorrow. It is believed that the advance guard, the three transports which followed the Charleston to Honolulu, met the cruiser there and sailed with her to the Philippines about the 8th of this month. In that case it is reasonable to expect them at Manila within a week.

Almost Ready.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—The four transport steamers scheduled to leave for Manila are almost ready for the signal from Major-General Greene's flagship, the China, to hoist anchor and proceed on their voyage. The steamer Senator, which lay at her dock all night taking on cargo and undergoing final preparation for the voyage, moved into the stream about noon. All morning long vessels were being put into shipshape condition, and about noon it was announced that everything was ready for departure. The soldiers spent a fairly comfortable night on board the transports in spite of the confusion accompanying the change from the camps to the

On to Porto Rico.

New York, June 15.—A Tribune Washington special says: The Fourth army corps, Major-General Coppinger commanding, has been designated to undertake the occupation of Porto Rico. It will be rapidly increased to a force of 20,000 men, including all available regulars now in the South, with the addition of the best volunteer regiments at Tampa, Chickamauga and Falls Church. These selections will be made in the next day or two with chief regard to the military qualifications of the volunteers and the comparative competence of their equipment.

Spanish Press Optimistic.

Madrid, June 11.—The Spanish press has increased its optimism based on the belief that Germany intends to prevent the bombardment of Manila bay by making a naval demonstration. The newspapers urge sacrifices with a view to securing Germany's assistance, and political leaders express themselves in favor of offering Germany the following concessions in return for her "taking the initiative in coercing America." Firstly, naval stations and coaling depots in Spanish Oceania. Secondly, Spanish concurrence in the development of Germany's commercial interests with Morocco.

Two Disasters in Alaska Waters.

Victoria, B. C., June 11.—Captain Pearson, of the schooner Rustler, which arrived here from Cook's inlet this morning, states that the schooner Alton, which sailed from Tacoma recently for the North, carrying a crew of six men, is believed to have been lost during the severe gale which occurred on May 27.

Victoria, B. C., June 11.—The captain of the steamer Lapwing, which has just returned from Alert bay, reports that nine sternwheeler of the Moran fleet of eleven were seriously damaged while attempting to cross [?] Charlotte Sound. The injured vessels put in at Port Alexander, where they will be repaired.

Waiships All at Santiago.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—The navy department today posted the following bulletin: "Mole St. Nicholas, June 14.—Lieutenant Blue has just returned after a tour of 79 statute miles of observation of the harbor of Manila. He reports that the Spanish attacked vigorously the camp at Guantamano. An outpost of four marines were killed and their bodies mutilated, barbarously. Surgeon Gibb's was killed."

All Will Reach Manila Together.

General H. G. Ois will today assume command of the Fourth brigade of the Manila expeditionary force. An officer on his staff states that the first and second expeditions will be held at Honolulu to await a third, so that all may reach Manila together. S. A. Hull, M. O. Wilkins, J. H. Harris, Mel Green and Mrs. J. W. Kays are among those attending the district conventions of Woodmen and Circle from Eugene.
