Spain Refuses to Give up Hobson and
his Men.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Word was re-
ceived today from Commodore Watson
to the effect that Captain-General Blanco
states that the Spanish government re-
fuses to exchange Hobson and his men.

No Change in the Situation at Manila.

MANILA, June 17, via Hong Kong,
June 19.—The situation here is un-
changed. The insurgents are unable to
take Manila, owing to their lack of field
guns. They could not take it even if
Admiral Dewey permitted, which he
will not.

Insurgents Hold 5000 Prisoners.

HONO KONO, June 20.—A steamer
just arrived from Manila says the in-
surgents hold 4000 Spaniards and 1000
native prisoners with their equipments.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

Portland, Or., June 20, 1898.
The crop prospects are better today
than they were one week ago, when it
was reported that they were the best
ever seen in Oregon. General rains
have fallen over the state during the
past week. While some hay was slight-
ly injured by being cut and rained upon,
and cherries in localities were slightly
injured by the rain, yet the rains were
of benefit to late hay, fruit, berries,
hops, and grain. The crop conditions
and prospects today are perfect. Unless
unprecedented weather conditions pre-
vail, which are not probable, Oregon's
crops this year will be greater in quan-
tity and finer in quality than any heret-
ofore gathered.

WESTERN OREGON.

Weather.—The week has been cool
and showery. The temperature aver-
aged 62 degrees, which is 7 degrees
lower than for the preceding week and high-
er than for the same week last year.
The highest temperature was 73 degrees
on Friday; the lowest 52 degrees this
morning. The total rainfall for the
week ranged from three-quarters of an
inch to one inch. The winds were gen-
erally southerly. The sunshine was in-
sufficient in amount.
Crops.—Haying has been commenced,
especially in the southern counties.
The grass is ready to cut throughout
this portion of the state, but it is delayed,
owing to the rains. A small amount of
hay has been injured somewhat by be-
ing rained upon. As soon as the weath-
er becomes fair, haying will be general.
The rains have caused some cherries,
especially on the lower branches, to rot;
the injury is not sufficient to cause a
financial loss, as there are more cherries
than can be marketed or for which there
are facilities for canning. The rains
likewise caused some strawberries to
rot. While the rains have produced the
foregoing, the good they did more than
compensate. The spring-sown wheat
and oats now promise yields as good, or
better, than the fall-sown. That the
grain crop will be unusually large, there
can be no question. Corn is in need
of warmer weather. The berry crop is un-
usually large. Except peaches in por-
tions of the Willamette Valley, fruit is a
large crop in every section.

There is no improvement in hops;
those that are up have excellent growth.

The missing hills will reduce the total
yield from one-third to one-half.
Flax for fiber is thirty-six inches high;
it will be ready to be pulled the latter
part of this month. Reports indicate
that flax culture is more successful in
Oregon than the most sanguine hoped
for. Wheat sown on land which last
year was used for growing flax, is better
than in adjoining fields.

Sugar beets are making a fine growth
and now promise better returns than
they did last year, when the experiment
was so successful. Pasturage is good
and stock is in prime condition.

The summer type of weather condi-
tions has not yet appeared. Its appear-
ance is delayed longer than usual; but
when it does appear, a change to fair
and warmer weather will occur immedi-
ately.
