OREGON FRUITS.

The Oregon strawberry annually introduces the fruit season, and it gets plenty and cheap a few days after the general ripening begins.

Early peaches come in the last of this month. They are usually watery at first. Summer apples come in on the heels of the early peaches in July.

For the past few years the codlin moth has played havoc with the Oregon apple. For many years previous to 1887 Oregon apples were famous for their rosy brilliancy and delicious flavor.

but no care was taken of the orchards, which were permitted to run down; the trees became moss-covered, the weeds choked the roots, and the foreign-born worm found ample protection.

More recently the orchardists have taken to using paris green and other substances to spray their orchards, and they have checked the worm's ravages.

THE MAIL FROM HONOLULU.

Some Definite Pointers About the Service.

The press dispatches having informed the good people of San Francisco in general that "our boys" of the Second Regiment had reached Honolulu on the first day of June, left there for Manila on Saturday, June 14th, and back in the interim, written some thousand letters to the home-folks.

In behalf of this anxiety the Statesman has the following items of information to offer, and they are reliable: The United States mail is dispatched regularly from the island capital, direct to San Francisco, three or four times a month.

The steamships holding mail contracts from this government belong to the Occidental & Oriental line, the trans Pacific department of the Pacific Mail S. Co., of San Francisco.

Work on the transports has progressed so favorably that they will probably be ready to sail by Saturday.

It is customary also, for the postal authorities at Honolulu to forward mails by trans steamers departing thence between the sailing dates of the regular boats.

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HALF A HUNDRED LIVES WERE LOST

At the Launching of a Battle-Ship at Blackwell, England.

LONDON, June 21.—During the launching of the British first-class battle-ship Albion, of 12,500 tons, at Blackwell today, by the Duchess of York, at which ceremony the United States ambassador, Colonel John Hay, and Mrs. Hay and Lieutenant Colonel Wells, United States naval attaché, assisted, the displacement of water caused an immense mass of water to rise on all sides, completely submerging one of the lower stages of the yard and tumbling hundreds of people.

The Duchess of York, Colonel and Mrs. Hay and the remainder of the distinguished guests did not see the accident, which occurred at the moment when three cheers were called for the successful launching, and the cries and screams of the victims were drowned by the outburst of hurrahs.

May be Ready to Sail by Saturday.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—With the addition of 200 recruits from Minnesota, 150 from Iowa and 100 men of the Astor battery, the force of troops at Camp Merritt has been increased to 12,200.

On board the Associated Press dispatch-boat Dandy, off Santiago de Cuba, Monday, June 20, 1 p. m., via Mole St. Nicholas, Haiti, Tuesday, June 21.

The United States army for the invasion of Cuba, about 16,000 strong, and commanded by General Shafter, arrived off Santiago de Cuba at noon today.

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FIVE THOUSAND PRISONERS.

Insurgents Have Everything Their Own Way at Manila.

HONG KONG, June 20.—The United States steamer Zaire, which has just arrived here, brings news from Manila under date of June 17, from which it appears that the insurgents now hold 4000 Spaniards and 1000 native prisoners together with their arms.

The cruiser Baltimore was to have left Manila June 17, to meet the Charleston and transports from San Francisco. The latter were expected shortly afterward.

Thirty carbineros who attempted to desert from the Spanish forces on June 15, were arrested and shot.

Aginaldo has informed Consul Williams of the formation of a provisional government, merely for cohesive purposes, and notified him of the desire of the insurgents that the Philippines become an American colony.

Americans at Manila say apparently friendly relations exist between the German and French squadrons.

The British second-class cruiser Bonaventure proceeded from Hong Kong for Manila yesterday, and another British warship is to follow her.

The British steamer Emerald left here yesterday for Manila in order to bring away refugees, and the British steamer Yuen Fang will leave today for the same purpose.

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May Go On the Philadelphia.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—Major-General Merritt may sail for Manila on the cruiser Philadelphia, which has received orders to be ready for sea by July 1.

The four-h fleet of transports to convey troops to Manila will probably consist of the City of Puebla, due here on the 21st inst., from Puget sound; the Fern, due on the 24th from Hong Kong; the Alameda, from Australia, and the Acapia, now on the way from Panama, due on the 28th inst.

The auxiliary cruisers at this port will be taken possession of by the naval reserves today. The Ispahan went to Mare island yesterday. Her armament has arrived in position on the vessel will go into commission. She may be sent to Manila to relieve the McCulloch, as a dispatch boat.

The other vessels of the auxiliary fleet will have their full complement of men in a few days, as orders have been issued for the naval militia to report for duty.

The revenue cutter Corwin, which has been in dock at the Union town wharf for several days, steamed up to Mare island yesterday and will at once be placed in commission. She is destined for San Diego, for harbor defense.

The British ships Bedford and Liverpool have arrived from Newcastle with nearly 6000 tons of coal. Their cargoes are consigned to local firms, but are understood to have been purchased by the government, and will probably be discharged into the bunkers at the Mare island navy yard.

The Astor light battery, numbering 101 men, including three officers, arrived this morning. The men composing the battery are by far the most handsome appearing soldiers which have yet arrived in this city.
