Letter From Cavite.
Cavite, June 9, 1898.
EDITOR PLAINDEALER:
We entered Manila Bay June 5, in the afternoon. It is indeed a very fine sight, one of the best harbors in the world. Commander Dwyer has just come aboard the Australia. He is a very bright appearing fellow. He certainly did some great work with the Spanish fleet. We have seen all of the boats that he captured and sunk. Have been aboard 3 of them that are partly sunk. The Americans have 9 men-of-war in this harbor, and there are 6 German and 3 or 4 English and some Japanese vessels, which make it look very warlike. We landed on July 1st, and quartered in an old Spanish garrison, probably 150 years old. The buildings are made of cement and stone with tiling roofs, and are put up very strong. The town is surrounded by thick stone walls and no doubt at the time they were built were very secure, but they will not resist our modern guns. The writer saw where Dwyer broke one of the walls and made a hole large enough to stand 10 horses abreast. This hole, besides tearing down the wall, cut out two hard wood posts, ten inches square, one on each side of a house, and it is hard to tell where it would have stopped had it not broken in two. I saw the place today where the Spaniards killed the Catholic priest. The priest told the Spaniards that they need not be alarmed, as he would see to it in his prayers that they would come out all right, but when it turned out otherwise they murdered him. There is about 400 persons here in captivity. The natives wanted to kill them but Dwyer would not let them. They think a great deal of Dwyer and anything he tells them is law and gospel. The majority of the natives here are Catholics. There are also a good many priests. They are fighting every night and capture a few Spaniards every time. They came in Wednesday with about 100 prisoners. The natives here are very quick to learn, and if they had not been held in captivity, would have been a very different lot of people now. They are great traders, and most every one has a basket with a few bananas, pine apples, etc. They ask you so much for one, and if you should buy one hundred they want as much accordingly. The money they have is one and one quarter cents, and five cents, besides they use Spanish and Japanese money.
You can get twice as much with an American dollar as you can with one of the Spanish. We have an arrangement with the chaplain, who gives us \$2.25 in Spanish money for \$1.00 in American. You can't buy any more from the natives with American money of the same denomination than you can with Spanish, so it stands us in hand to change it for Spanish coin. As soon as the city was captured by Dwyer the natives carried away everything they could. It seems strange to pass by one of their huts and hear them thumping on pianos. You will see some huts with fine chairs, tables, stands, etc., that they have carried away from the garrison. They have some peculiar looking horses that are about the size of Carps' mules. They hitch them up to a cart (large enough for a small sized horse to pull) and they just go cutting and slashing. When they want to carry anything, from one pound to one hundred pounds, they carry it right on the top of their heads and trot right off. They raise hogs, buffalo cattle, goats, chickens, ducks, etc. Their chickens are very small, not much larger than bantams. Their hogs are very inferior to ours. The buffalo cattle are just a little smaller than the Jerseys. This is indeed a wonderful place and surely affords a great many opportunities, and should this become a part of the U. S. A., it will be a good place for a young man with enterprise to come to.
Quite a number of Co. I's boys are sick. They have stomach trouble, caused by drinking too much water and eating fruit. We had a grand review the 4th of July. Harry Slocum and I feel quite flattered. Harry was selected as one of the color sergeants to carry the colors on shore when we landed at Cavite, and I had the honor to be chosen color sergeant to carry the colors on the 4th of July. We are waiting for the Monterey to come, and as soon as she arrives we will undertake to capture Manila, and very likely before this reaches you we will have captured the place. We would like to see a PLAINDEALER, the last one we saw was at Presidio.

NOT TO EXCEED \$5,000,000.
Reliable Estimate of the Klondike Gold Output.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—E. E. Leach, superintendent of the United States mint in this city, estimates that the gold output of the Klondike this year has been only about \$5,000,000. The receipts at the mint here have amounted to about \$1,750,000 since the first arrival of Yukon gold a few weeks ago.
The receipts of the Seattle assay office have been about the same. The largest single deposit at the mint here was \$120,000. Mr. Leach estimates that about \$250,000 in dust and nuggets has gone East, and that there is about \$1,000,000 of this season's output yet to reach this country. It is stated that the dust brought out by the North American Trading and Transportation Company was sent East, and was not included in Mr. Leach's figures. This amount might possibly reach \$500,000. From this showing it would appear that \$6,000,000 would be a safe and conservative estimate of the entire Yukon output, including the American side as well as the Klondike.
