

Tailcoos Rippled.

Dry weather prevails with the north-westerly trade winds and high fogs at night. We do not have many foggy days here in which the fogs hang low. The fact is, we have far less of fog here than in the valleys, especially in the winter. Our foggy days are warmer than in Rogue River or Umpqua Valleys. Of cloudy days—clouds being simply high fogs—we have more than the inland valleys.

For orchard fruits and grains the inland valleys excel us but for stock-raising dairying, small fruits and vegetables we have no competitors, or at least none can excel us. We want more people to engage in dairying and stock-raising. Several families can be located on good government land. We invite good thrifty people to come. As our lands are timbered or brushy settlers should have a little ready cash to start with. But little land needs to be cleared for the plow. For clover or grass for pasture it needs only to be slashed, brush burned and then seeded down. There is a ready market for butter, eggs and fat or stock cattle.

With settlers come roads which are just now our greatest need. There is about ten miles of road to be made between Gardiner and Alene. Supervisor Sully in district I is pushing his work along this season. Supervisor L. F. Anderson, district 22, will do his part. The county court has at last granted district 22 a plow and scraper. The good people of the district certainly appreciate this favor from the court and will long remember Judge Lyons and our honorable commissioners. Some of citizens seem to be under the impression that the new county judge and commissioners will not be willing to do a liberal part by the roads over here on the frontier. It is in my judgment a mistake. Judge Lyons will do all that the laws and the state of county finances will permit. Mr. Thompson, we all know to be friendly to the enterprise of opening the road from Gardiner to Glenda. He knows our needs and our environments. It is my candid opinion that the greatest obstacle we will have to overcome is the indifference of our own people. Possibly indifference is not just the word to use.

It may be that our folks are doing all they are able to do. It is not fair for anyone to undertake to say how much his neighbor should do. Let us do all we can. That new county judge and commissioner are all right. The judge is, I know, because he is a Hoosier. All Hoosiers are good men where the question of good roads is involved. This is no time to argue and bicker among ourselves as to whether we shall go over or around a hill with the road, go around it, or cut, even if the road is a rod longer. It were better to move a load a little further on an easy grade than to lift that load from 30 to 75 feet higher than necessary. It is a fact that from Fiddle Creek to five mile creek there is an easy pass via Wilkes landing. It is also a fact that the surveyed route for a road between these points is simply execrable. Let those who want a decent road assess themselves and the thing is done. Besides securing a far better road this change will give quite a number more people the benefit of a county road and really harm no one. Let's quit "foolin" and go to work.

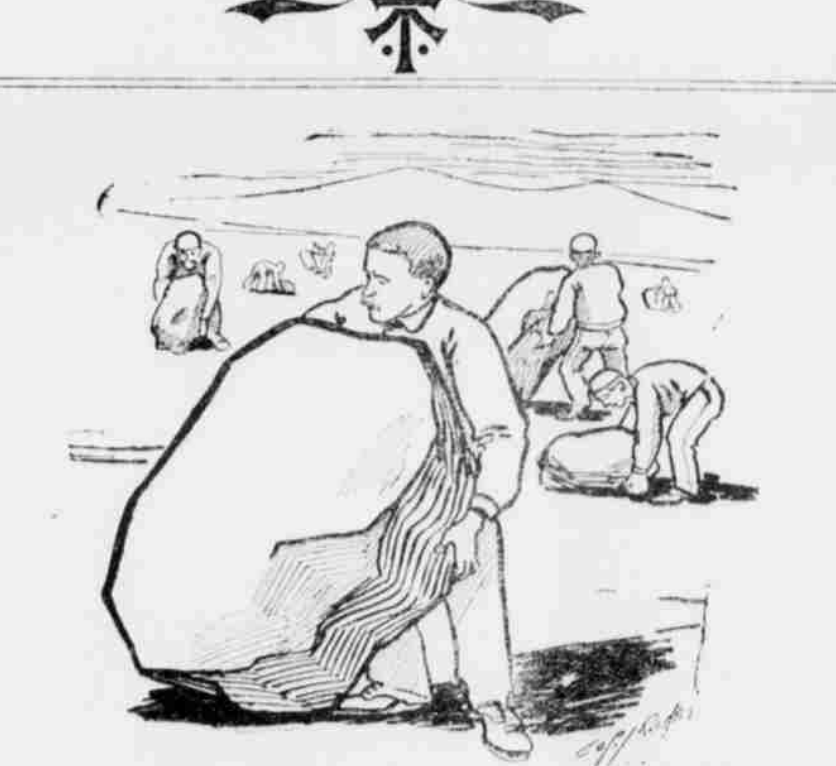
