HISTORICAL PRINTING PRESS.

It Was Brought to Oregon by Dr. Marcus Whitman.

The first printing press ever seen in Oregon, which has for many years reposed in the office of the state board of horticulture at the capitol, is there no more. It has been taken by the Oregon Pioneer Association and will be sent to Eugene and placed in the museum of the state university. The press is an historic piece of mechanism. It was originally produced in Boston by the American Methodist Missionary Society and sent to the resident missionaries at Honolulu, Sandwitch Islands, being shipped around Cape Horn on a trading vessel. When Marcus Whitman reached Oregon and planted his mission station in the territory, the Honolulu missionaries presented him with the press. The force in State Printer Lynds' office cleaned the press Saturday, and used it in printing a roster of the employees of the office as a souvenir.
