Discharges for Oregon Boys When Places Are Filled by Regulars.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—As time goes on the demands received by the various members of the Oregon delegation to secure the release of this and that member of the Oregon volunteers continue to increase in number, each day's mail containing a large number of requests, both from the soldiers themselves and from their friends. There are quite a number of the volunteers anxious to secure discharges, some for one reason, others having other reasons. The department has adopted a rule of late, however, which allows discharges to be granted only in case of severe illness, either in the case of the soldier or in his family at home, or such cases as are everywhere recognized as being of the utmost importance to those involved.
To satisfy the demands that are constantly being made, however, the various members of the delegation have, from time to time, renewed their requests at the war department for the discharge of individual members of the Oregon regiment, but with the exception of such instances as just cited have met with refusal every time. The following is an extract from a letter which Representative Tongue has just received from the adjutant-general of the army in this regard which was written at the direction of the secretary of war, and shows the intention of the department with regard to volunteer soldiers in the Philippine Islands.
"Referring to your letter of recent date, asking for the discharge of certain members of the Second Oregon volunteers now serving in the Philippine Islands, whose discharge from the army is requested, I would respectfully inform you that it is the intention of the department to return to the United States all volunteer organizations now serving in those islands as soon and as rapidly as their places can be taken by troops of the regular army, six regiments of which are now under orders to that place. At present the maintaining of public interests will not permit the discharge of individual members, except in extremely distressing circumstances, and of this class but few are brought to the attention of the department."
