OVERLAND WRECKED

In Cow Creek Canyon Near Nichols Station.

WAS CAUSED BY A WASHOUT

Fireman Mike DeYaney and an Unknown Tramp Narrowly Escape Death.

On Tuesday morning about 5 o'clock, the southbound overland passenger train which passed through Roseburg at about 2:50 a. m., was wrecked in Cow Creek canyon at a point about one mile south of Nichols station and about eight north of West Fork. It seems that at this point the flume which carries the water and tallings from a placer mine, passes under the track and empties into Cow creek, and the high water caused by the heavy rains had brought down heavy drift wood and washed out the track. The train approached in the darkness and plunged into the cut caused by the washout, and rolled over at the very brink of the swollen waters of Cow creek. As the engine rolled over, Engineer Waite escaped by climbing out through the cab window and was uninjured. Fireman Mike DeYaney, however, was caught under the engine and pinned in between the fire box and a pile of driftwood, in such a position that the hot waters from the flume poured over him at times and threatened his death. At the same time he was being scalded by the steam and scorching by the heat from the engine.

The train employees assisted by the passengers did heroic work in attempting to release him and in protecting him as well as possible from what appeared to be certain death.

The wreck was in such a position that it was almost impossible to reach him, and the only way that anything could be accomplished was by shipping away the heavy timbers with a chisel. In this trying position he remained about six hours, until the wrecking train arrived on the scene from Roseburg, when he was released.

Fortunately his injuries outside of the exposure and trying conditions of his situation, are not so serious as were expected. His left leg is scalded above the knee, and his right foot and ankle is scalded and somewhat sprained, but his physician reports that his injuries are not permanent or serious.

The only other person who was injured was an unknown tramp, who was stealing a ride on the blind baggage, and sustained a burned leg. Taking everything into consideration, it was very fortunate that no lives were lost.

Aaron Rose the Father of Roseburg Is Dead

WAS A PIONEER OF 1851

Passed Away Quietly Yesterday At The Rippe Age Of Almost 87 years.

Although not unexpected, the many friends of Aaron Rose Sr., were startled and grieved at the announcement of his death, which took place at 10:45 o'clock a. m., yesterday, March 1st, in this city.

Mr. Rose was a native of New York, but came from Michigan across the plains to Oregon, arriving at this point Sept. 23rd, 1851, and located the donation claim on which the original town of Roseburg is now situated, and where he has since resided.

He always manifested a live interest in the prosperity of his native city and county, being always liberal and progressive, ready to give of his time and means to forward any worthy public enterprise.

He numbered as his friends the whole population of the community, in which he lived, and scattered all over the land are to be found those who will bear witness to the truth of his death.

His was an honest, charitable and genial disposition, and his pleasant greetings will be sadly missed by old and young. He was nearly 87 years of age, and leaves four children to mourn his loss and cherish his memory: Mrs. Rufus Mallory, of Portland; Mrs. Emily Martin, of Livermore, Calif.; Aaron Rose, Jr., of this city and Cora Rose residing in Happy Valley, in this county.

Arrangements have not been completed for the funeral, which will be held Saturday, but it will be under the charge of the Masonic fraternity, of which deceased was a prominent member.
